Commentary on passages from documentary and legal texts will be compulsory.</u></p>
Explanatory Notes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> This new subject is being offered in response to a strong and sustained campaign for an imperial period subject, bridging the gap in coverage between the early and late Empire. There are no vested interests. Students were also informed about the planned introduction of the new paper in February 2014.
