(1) Voting on changes to Congregation Regulations 1 of 2002: Membership of Congregation

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Humanities Divisional Board, reflect the renaming of the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art as the Ruskin School of Art. This change of name reflects more broadly that it is an "Art School" that covers all facets of art from drawing and painting through to sculpturing, film-making and performing.

Text of Regulations

In Congregation Regulations 1 of 2002, concerning membership of Congregation,

delete existing regulation 1(8) and substitute (deleted text scored through):

'(8) the Tutors in Fine Art at the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art;'.

Regulations to be made by Council if the Regulations are approved

1 In Council Regulations 2 of 2004, concerning other University Bodies, delete existing Part 7 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'Part 7: Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art

7.1. There shall be a Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art consisting of:

(1), (2) two persons appointed by the Humanities Board, one of whom shall chair the committee;

(3) the Ruskin Master of Drawing;

(4)-(7) four other persons holding teaching posts in the Ruskin School, who shall be elected by all those holding such posts except the Ruskin Master of Drawing under arrangements as per Council Regulation 19 of 2002, regulations 31<u>36</u>-39<u>44</u>;

(8) a person appointed by the Committee of Senior Tutors.

7.2. (1) The committee may co-opt not more than five persons as additional members.

(2) The period of office for appointed, elected, and co-opted members shall be three years, and no appointed, elected or co-opted member shall serve more than two consecutive full terms of office. Casual terms of office shall not count towards this limit.

(3) Notwithstanding regulation (2) above, in the case of appointed and coopted members the General Purposes Committee of Council may determine that one further consecutive period is permitted in an individual case.

7.3. The committee shall have the function and powers of a board of a faculty as defined in Council Regulations 19 of 2002, regulation 2, in respect of the Ruskin School and the Study of Fine Art in the University.

7.4. Student members shall be represented at meetings of the committee by:

(1) the chairman of the Ruskin School Joint Consultative Committee;

(2) a person appointed by the Ruskin School Joint Consultative Committee from among its own members. 7.5. The student members shall:

(1) serve for one year, and shall be eligible for re-election if they remain members of the Ruskin School Joint Consultative Committee;

(2) be entitled to speak at meetings of the committee but not to vote;

(3) respect the conventions of the committee as set out in its standing orders.

7.6. (1) No student member shall be present for the discussion of reserved business as defined in regulation 7<u>8</u> of the Regulations for Council.

(2) The student members shall receive the full committee agenda paper but not the papers or minutes relating to reserved business.'

(2) the head of the college to which the Ruskin Mastership shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any decree in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;

(4) a person appointed by Council;

(5) a person appointed by the Humanities Board;

(6), (7) two persons appointed by the Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art;

(8) a person appointed by the Visitors of the Ashmolean Museum;

(9) one person appointed by the Committee for the History of Art.

3. The interest on the capital sum accepted by the University from the late John Ruskin under the Deed of Declaration of Trust 1875 for the endowment of a Mastership of Drawing shall be used towards defraying the stipend of the Ruskin Master.'

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133–59), after Part 72 insert the following new Part 73¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'§316. Part 73: Scatcherd Scholarships

73.1. The University has received with gratitude a legacy from Mrs Jane Ledig-Rowohlt to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Scatcherd Scholarship Fund ("the Fund").

<u>73.</u>2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets (if any) in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").

<u>73.</u>3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards: (i) awarding scholarships to students <u>of Oxford University of British</u> citizenship allowing them to engage in

study or research in other countries; and (ii) awarding scholarships to citizens of with preference being given to students ordinarily resident in a nation of continental Europe from the Atlantic to the Urals with the exception of Turkey.

<u>73.</u>4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income and capital, shall be the responsibility of the board of management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.

73.5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

<u>73.</u>6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Scholarship.

<u>73.</u>7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

<u>73.</u>8. Regulations <u>Sections 73.</u>1-<u>73.</u>10 shall be deemed to be trust Regulations provisions under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

73.9. Subject to regulation section 73.10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

- (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
- (2) be outside the objects of the University.

73.10. Any amendment to regulation section 73.3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Scatcherd Scholarships, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133–59), after Part 71 insert the following new Part 72¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

"**§317. Part 72**: Scatcherd <u>Science</u> Scholarships

<u>72.</u>1. The University accepts from the Trustee of the Campaign for Oxford Trust Fund the sum of £621,000, made possible by an extremely generous benefaction from Mrs Jane Ledig-Rowohlt, to establish a fund, the net income of which shall be applied in the funding of Scatcherd <u>Science</u> Scholarships for the support of graduate study in science.

72.2. The fund shall be administered by the International Committee. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the board of management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.

72.3. The scholarships shall be awarded to persons from any European country (other than the U.K. or Turkey but including Russia and all other countries to the west of the Urals) to enable themstudents to study for a graduate degree of the University in a science subject (including mathematics and medicine). The committee shall endeavour to ensure that at any one time one of the scholarships shall be held by a person from a country outside the European Union. Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in any European country (other than the UK or Turkey but including Russia and all other countries to the west of the Urals).

<u>72.</u>4. Any income not spent in any year shall be carried forward for expenditure in subsequent years.

<u>72.</u>5. Council shall have power to alter this decree Part from time to time, provided that the main object of the fund, as defined in clause 1 section 72.1 above, is always kept in view.'

A revised legislative proposal, bringing the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be citizens of) the United Kingdom, is being submitted to Congregation in response to comments from the Charity Commission and discussion with the Privy Council Office.

(7) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal amends the nature of and selection committee for the studentship, and brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be citizens of) the United Kingdom.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133-59), after Part 78 insert the following new Part 79¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'**§138. <u>Part 79:</u>** Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund

<u>79.</u>1. The University accepts with gratitude from Mr and Mrs John Griffiths a gift of assets to establish a fund in memory of their son, to be known as the Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund.

<u>79.</u>2. The board of management for the fund shall be the Board of the Faculty of English Language and Literature, which shall make regulations concerning the award of the studentship.

<u>79</u>.3. The net income of the fund shall be used, if there is a suitable candidate, to provide a studentship to a citizen of the United Kingdom to study for a taught graduate degree in a field relating to the history of the book in the British Isles before 1625-1550. Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.

<u>79.4. The selection committee for the studentship shall consist of</u>

(1) the Director of Graduate Studies of the Board of the Faculty of English Language and Literature;

(2) the Reader in Bibliography and Textual Criticism;

(3) the University Lecturer in Palaeography;

(4) the J.R.R. Tolkien Professor of English Literature and Language or his or her nominee;

(5), (6) two persons appointed by the Governing Body of St John's College.

Selection of the studentship recipient will be in line with Faculty graduate admissions procedures in consultation with the J.R.R. Tolkien Professor of English Literature and Language, the Jeremy Griffiths Professor of Medieval English Palaeography and St Hilda's College, as necessary.

<u>79.</u>5. The studentship shall be tenable at St John's <u>Hilda's</u> College.

<u>79.</u>6. The studentship shall normally be awarded for a period of two <u>one</u> years but <u>and</u> may be renewed for not more than one further year <u>for a student continuing to the</u> <u>MPhil English</u>.

<u>79.</u>7. Holders of the studentship shall be required to submit an annual report to the board of management, and c<u>C</u>ontinued tenure of the award shall depend upon satisfactory progress towards completion of the graduate degree concerned.

<u>79.</u>8. Income not expended in any year shall be carried forward for expenditure in subsequent years.

<u>79</u>.9. Council shall have power to amend this decree <u>Part</u> from time to time, provided that the purposes of the fund, as defined in ell: <u>sections 79</u>.1; <u>and 79</u>.3; and 5 above, shall always be kept in view.'

A revised legislative proposal, bringing the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by removing criteria which can only be met by Roman Catholic men and by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be born in, with parents who are citizens of) the Republic of Ireland, is being submitted to Congregation in response to comments from the Charity Commission and discussion with the Privy Council Office.

(9) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Prendergast Fund

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by removing criteria which can only be met by Roman Catholic men and by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be born in, with parents who are citizens of) the Republic of Ireland.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Prendergast Fund, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In Part 47 of the Schedule to the University Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002) delete section 47.1 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'47.1. The bequest of the residue of the estate of Dr J.S. Prendergast shall be used:

(1) for the creation of two bursaries to be held by members of the Order of St Benedict belonging to Glenstal Abbey, Murroe, County Limerick, while they pursue their studies at St Benet's Hall, the maximum value of such bursaries to be set by the board of management for the bequest at its discretion; and

(2) to assist <u>students</u> persons born in the Republic of Ireland whose parents are citizens of the Republic of Ireland to proceed to the University for the purpose of either taking their degrees or undergoing postgraduate courses. <u>Preference will be</u> given to candidates ordinarily resident in the Republic of Ireland.'

(10) Voting on Resolution authorising the allocation of the Mathematical Institute building (Building 177) on St Giles'

Explanatory Note

On 24 March 2009, Congregation authorised the allocation of a site on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter for the construction of a new Mathematical Institute building. The Mathematical Institute relocated to the new building in September 2013. The relocation of the Mathematical Institute frees up three properties, including its former main building (Building 177) on St Giles'. Council (on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee and its Buildings and Estates Subcommittee) proposes that this building be allocated to the Department of Statistics. This allocation will create a hub for Statistics in Oxford, consolidating activity that is currently split across three buildings, and provide space for planned growth. Statistics will continue to have one small satellite site (within the Henry Wellcome Building for Gene Function).

Text of Resolution

That, following the relocation of the Mathematical Institute to the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter, the Mathematical Institute building (Building 177) on St Giles' (approximately 1,895 sq m net usable area) be allocated to the Department of Statistics.

(11) Voting on Resolution authorising the allocation of space at the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter

Explanatory Note

The University's Museums all have need of space to house those artefacts for which there is insufficient space within their main buildings. For the long term, consideration is being given to the development of a Joint Museums' Collections Study Centre which would bring together all such artefacts on a single site. In the meantime, these needs are being met by various space allocations in and around Oxford. The Ashmolean Museum has, since 2005, used space in the Harkness Building on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter for this purpose. Congregation is asked to authorise the extended use of that space.

As the Harkness Building is marked for demolition in delivery of the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter Masterplan, only a temporary allocation is proposed.

Text of Resolution

That 919 sq m net usable area in the Harkness building be allocated to the Ashmolean Museum on a temporary basis until 31 December 2018, or, if earlier, until a Joint Museums' Collections Study Centre (or alternative long-term solution to the museums' need to accommodate their reserve collections) is available for use.

Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XI: University Discipline

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal amends the legislation relating to student disciplinary procedures. The amendments will enable the Student Disciplinary Panel to dismiss insubstantial appeals against immediate fines imposed by the Proctors (eg for antisocial behaviour following University examinations), and to allow the Proctors to implement a fines escalator for non-payment of fines. The aim is to improve the operation of the procedures, while safeguarding equity and the principles of natural justice. The opportunity is also being taken to clarify an existing provision and update an obsolete reference.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend Statute XI concerning University discipline, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

1 In Statute XI concerning University Discipline delete existing section 11(1) and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'11.(1) The Student Disciplinary Panel shall also have the function of hearingdetermining, in accordance with <u>the</u> procedures set out in <u>the</u> regulations made under section 20 of this statute, appeals made by student members under sections 27, 34 (2) and 41 (5).'

2 Ibid, delete existing section 13 and substitute (new text underlined):

'13. If a student member is aggrieved by a decision of the Student Disciplinary Panel he or she may <u>apply for permission to</u> appeal to the Student Appeal Panel.'

3 Ibid, delete existing section 29(1) and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'If the Student Disciplinary Panel, the Student Appeal Panel, or the Proctors in the course of proceedings or an investigation under this statute has or have reasonable grounds for believing that a student member is suffering from a serious problem arising from ill-health the Panel concerned or the Proctors shall refer the student to the University's Occupational Health Service<u>Fitness to Study Panel</u> in accordance with the procedures set out in Part B of Statute XIII.'

4 Ibid, delete existing section 40 and substitute (new text underlined):

'40.(1) Where a fine is imposed upon a student member, or an order is made requiring a student member to pay compensation, under the provisions of this statute, the fine or compensation shall be paid within seven days (or two days, in the case of immediate fines imposed under section 23) whether or not an application for permission to appeal or an appeal is pending, unless the person or body which imposed the fine or compensation, or the Panel to which any application for permission to appeal or appeal is made, makes an order, in accordance with procedure set out in regulations made under section 20 of this statute, suspending or deferring payment.

(2) If the fine or compensation is not paid in time the Panel which imposed it (or, in the case of a fine, <u>escalated fine</u> or compensation imposed by the Proctors, the Student Disciplinary Panel) may rusticate the student member for such period as it thinks fit, in accordance with procedure set out in regulations made under section 20 of this statute.

(3) Any fine or compensation imposed by any Panel or by the Proctors shall be paid through the Clerk to the Proctors.'

Changes in Regulations to be made by Council if the changes to Statute XI are approved

1 In Council Regulations 3 of 2006 concerning Regulations for the Student Disciplinary Panel, insert new regulation 4.2 as follows and renumber subsequent regulations accordingly:

'4.2 (1) When, under Statute XI, Part C, section 23 (3), the appeal relates to the imposition of an "immediate fine", permission to appeal must first be sought, in writing and through the Secretary, from the Chairman or a Vice-Chairman of the Student Disciplinary Panel within seven days of the imposition of the fine.

(2) The Secretary shall then refer the Application for Permission to Appeal to the Proctors within three working days.

(3) The Proctors must then make any response to the Application to the Secretary within seven days.

(4) The Secretary shall then refer both the Application and the Proctors' response to it to the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman within three working days.

(5) The Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or a Vice-Chairman may request the applicant and/or the Proctors to provide any further information relevant to the proposed appeal which he or she may require in determining whether permission to appeal should be granted.

(6) The application shall be determined without a hearing on the basis of the documents submitted unless the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or a Vice-Chairman considers that, in the interests of justice, a hearing should take place.

(7)(i) The relevant Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall, following receipt of all relevant papers, make a decision as to whether the application will be allowed or not allowed, unless he or she decides in accordance with (6) above that a hearing should take place.

(ii) If the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman decides that a hearing should take place he or she will communicate that decision to the Secretary who will inform the applicant and the Proctors of the date and time when and the place in Oxford at which the application will be heard.

(iii) The application will be heard by the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman sitting alone.

(8) In deciding whether to give permission to appeal the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall have regard to all the circumstances of the case including:

(i) the importance of the case to the appellant; and

(ii) whether the proposed appeal has reasonable prospects of success.

(9) The Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall within seven days of receipt of all papers or of any hearing, if later, send his or her decision with reasons in writing to the applicant and the Proctors via the Secretary of the Student Disciplinary Panel.

(10) If the Permission to Appeal is granted, then the Secretary shall convene a hearing of the Student Disciplinary Panel in accordance with Part 4 of these regulations.

(11) If the Permission to Appeal is refused, then the applicant shall have the right to make an Application for Permission to Appeal to the Student Appeal Panel, in accordance with Part 8 of these regulations.'

2 Ibid, delete existing regulation 6.1 and substitute (new text underlined):

'6.1. If a student who is ordered to pay a fine or compensation by the Proctors, the Disciplinary Panel, or the Appeal Panel under the provisions of Statute XI or any regulations made under it fails to do so within the time for making payment, the Proctors shall (subject to the provisions of regulation 6.2 below) prepare and deliver to the Secretary a notice of hearing stating:

(1) the date on which the order for payment was made;

(2) the amount of the payment;

(3) the date or dates by which payment should have been made;

(4) the amounts (if any) which have been paid and the date of payment; and

(5) the amount due.'

3 Ibid, insert new regulation 6.2 as follows and renumber subsequent regulations accordingly:

'6.2. If a student who is ordered to pay a fine by the Proctors (including an "immediate fine") under the provisions of Statute XI, or any regulation made under it, fails to do so within the time limit for making the payment, then the fine may increase in accordance with Council Regulations 6 of 2006. In such cases the Proctors shall not refer the matter to the Student Disciplinary Panel unless the fine remains unpaid at the end of the maximum escalation period.'

4 In Council Regulations 6 of 2006, concerning Regulations for Fines and Compensation imposed under Statute XI, delete existing regulation 2 and substitute as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

<u>'2. (a) If a fine or compensation order</u> <u>imposed under section 25 (3) (a)</u> <u>of Statute XI is not paid before the</u> <u>specified deadline for payment and</u> <u>no order allowing deferral of payment</u> pending an appeal has been granted (in circumstances where there is provision for such an order to be made), the student member concerned shall be liable to pay the original fine or compensation order together with:

(i) an additional fine of £25 for the first seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding;

(ii) a further additional fine of £25 for the subsequent seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding; and

(iii) after fourteen calendar days, a further additional fine of £25 for the subsequent seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding.

(b) The Proctors shall refer to the Student Disciplinary Panel the case of any student member who fails to pay a fine or compensation order within twenty-one calendar days of the original deadline for payment.

23. The maximum laid down in regulation 1 above, and the additional fines for nonpayment specified in regulation 2 (a) above, shall be reviewed annually by the Proctors.'
