Linacre: revised statutes

The revised Statutes entirely replace the existing Statutes of Linacre College. The current Statutes were drawn up in 1986. They are now out of date and do not reflect best practice in charity governance or the content and appropriate wording of charitable governing documents. The proposed new Statutes fundamentally change the college's governance structures:

- The composition of Governing Body remains largely unchanged, comprising the Principal, the Official Fellows, the Professorial Fellows, the Senior Research Fellows, two Junior Research Fellows, and four student members including the President of the Common Room. Governing Body is given powers to appoint and remove a Trustee Board, the Principal and Fellows. It may make and alter the Charter, Statutes and Regulations. It may consider reports and make recommendations to the

Trustee Board. It will delegate to the Trustee Board all powers of the College not reserved to Governing Body.

- The Trustee Board will comprise up to seven members of the Governing Body, the President of the Common Room, a Junior Research Fellow, and three independent Trustees. Members of the College's senior management team may not be appointed to the Trustee Board. The Board will usually meet every two months.
- New statutes are introduced regulating (III) Powers of the College, (VI) Meetings and decisions of the Governing Body, (VII) the Trustee Board, (VIII) Meetings and decisions of the Trustee Board, (XIV) Application of income and assets, (XV) Conflicts of interest and loyalty, (XVI) Delegation and committees, (XVII) Regulations, (XVIII) Administrative provisions, and (XX) Interpretation.
