REQUEST FROM THE FORUM FOR NAGA RECONCILIATION FOR THE RETURN OF 40 ANCESTRAL HUMAN REMAINS

In accordance with the procedure for dealing with repatriation claims set out in the University's Human Remains Policy and Procedures for the return of Human Remains, the Visitors of the Pitt Rivers Museum have considered a claim from the Forum for Naga Reconciliation for the return of 40 ancestral human remains held in the collections the Pitt Rivers Museum. The Forum for Naga Reconciliation has been fully authorised by the relevant Naga tribal councils to submit the claim on their behalf. The Visitors are recommending that Council agree to the return of 39 of the 40 human remains.

The procedure for claims to return human remains as laid out in the Policy on Human Remains held by the University of Oxford's Museums (www.glam.ox.ac.uk/human-remains-policy) requires that, when the governing body of the relevant museum has submitted a claim, notice of the recommendation and availability of the dossier of the case for consultation should be advertised in the *Gazette*, giving parties with an interest an opportunity to comment.

Any comments received are to be considered by Council in reaching a final decision on the recommendation submitted by the Board of Visitors of the Museum. The dossier may be consulted on application to Marina de Alarcon, Head of Collections, Pitt Rivers Museum, Oxford University (email: marina.dealarcon@prm.ox.ac.uk). Any submission regarding the Visitors' recommendation should also be sent to Marina de Alarcón by **26 March**.
