General Purposes Committee of Council

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **29 November**, unless notice of a resolution calling

upon Council to annul or amend the regulation is received by the Registrar by **noon on 25 November** (as set out in [Statute VI: Council](#)).

Regulations for the Little Princess Trust Professor of Paediatric Oncology

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made to establish the Little Princess Trust Professorship of Paediatric Oncology in the Regulations. The University has received with thanks a generous donation from the Little Princess Trust totalling £3.3 million. This donation is establishing an endowed Chair, and therefore will support the cost of the post in perpetuity. The Endowment Challenge Fund will provide matched funding for the role, increasing the total expendable endowment to £5 million.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 24 of 2002](#), concerning individual professorships, insert as follows:

‘The Little Princess Trust Professorship of Paediatric Oncology

1. The Little Princess Trust Professor of Paediatric Oncology shall engage in advanced study and research and shall lecture and give instruction in paediatric oncology.

2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

- (1) the Vice-Chancellor;
- (2) the head of the college to which the Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time; or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;
- (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college;
- (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;
- (6)–(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.’

VOTING ARRANGEMENTS

A first round of voting took place at a Convocation in the week commencing 28 October for the purpose of electing a Chancellor.

As outlined on the Chancellor's election webpage (www.ox.ac.uk/about/organisation/university-officers/chancellor/chancellor-election), this election uses the Alternative Vote system, whereby voters can rank as many of the candidates as they choose. Lower-ranking candidates have now been eliminated; 5 candidates remain. These 5 candidates (listed below in alphabetical order) are going forward to a second round, to take place during Week 6 of Michaelmas term (week commencing 18 November). The first candidate

to achieve 50% of the vote following the second round will be elected Chancellor. The election is taking place online only and is administered by Civica. The election is conducted in accordance with the provisions of Council Regulations 8 of 2002 ([Gazette No 5421, pp440–1](#)); these regulations are available on the University website at: <https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/legislation/council-regulations-8-of-2002>. Registered voters will receive an email directly from Civica with a link to cast their vote for the second round.

The new Chancellor will be announced during Week 7 (week commencing 25 November).

THE CHANCELLORSHIP

Statutory provision

[Statute IX, sections 2–5](#), provides as follows.

‘2. The Chancellor shall be elected by Convocation and shall hold office for a fixed period decided by Council or until their resignation.

3. There shall be a Chancellor’s Court of Benefactors to membership of which the Chancellor may from time to time admit major benefactors of the University.

4. The Chancellor shall have such other functions and powers as are assigned to them by the statutes and regulations or by the law of the land.

5. In the event of the incapacity or absence abroad of the Chancellor, or during a vacancy in the Chancellorship, or on delegation from the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor may exercise any of the functions and powers of the Chancellor, except where the statutes provide otherwise.’

STATEMENT ON THE CHARACTERISTICS OF A CHANCELLOR

For the guidance of candidates and electors

The Chancellor is the ceremonial head of the University of Oxford. While this key role has no executive responsibilities, it is more than symbolic; the Chancellor provides supportive and useful advice and guidance to the University, particularly to the Vice-Chancellor. The Chancellor presides at events such as Encaenia and at the Chancellor’s Court of Benefactors and is sometimes expected to take a leading role at other official events. The Chancellor is the Visitor (an external figure of authority on whom the college can call for advice and for arbitration if insoluble dispute arises among its governing body) of five colleges and also chairs the Committee for the Nomination of the Vice-Chancellor. In addition to these formal duties, the Chancellor undertakes advocacy, advisory and fundraising work, acting as an ambassador for the University at a range of local, national and international events. The Chancellor

must be readily accessible and available throughout the year.

The University is seeking a candidate who can demonstrate:

1. outstanding achievements in their field and the ability to command respect beyond it;
2. a deep appreciation for the University’s research and academic mission, its global community, and its ambition to remain a world-class research and teaching university;
3. the ability and willingness to enhance the reputation of the University locally, nationally and abroad.

CANDIDATE LIST

Following elimination of lower-ranking candidates during the first round of voting, 5 candidates go forward to a second round of voting.

Candidates have been considered by the Chancellor’s Election Committee solely against the specific exclusion criteria as laid out in [Part 7 of Council Regulations 8 of 2002](#), with no subjective selection process.

A flysheet containing a list of these 5 candidates, along with their personal statements of up to 750 words, is published with [Gazette No 5436, 7 November 2024](#).

The candidates’ statements of interest have been reproduced exactly as submitted.
