Voting on a Resolution authorising the allocation of space in the Tinsley Building to the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Divisional Office

Explanatory Note

As required by section 4 of Statute XVI, approval of this resolution is requested because of the size of the proposed space allocation.

The Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Divisional Office currently occupies space at 9 Parks Road, a Grade II-listed former residential property with limited accessibility and which constrains the Divisional Office's ability to collaborate effectively. Upon completion of the Life and Mind Building, the Departments of Biology and Experimental Psychology will vacate approximately

764 sqm net usable area within the Tinsley Building, which is considered well suited to meet Divisional Office requirements. Relocation to this space will allow the Divisional Office to adopt increased open-plan and hot-desk working practices for its 85 staff, provide modern meeting rooms with audio-visual technology, improved accessibility, and co-locate divisional support functions more effectively. The reallocation supports the University's strategic estate plan by consolidating administrative services into higher quality, more efficient space and releasing 9 Parks Road for alternative use.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 764 sqm net usable area within the Tinsley Building (building 345) be allocated to the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Divisional Office for a non-time-limited period, commencing

1 December 2025 or from the date of release by the Departments of Biology and Experimental Psychology, whichever is sooner.

Candidates' statements will be published online and in the *Gazette* dated Thursday 13 November. Voters may wish to read these statements before completing their electronic vote. The voting period will close at **4pm on Thursday 27 November 2025**.

Uncontested elections

If the number of nominations received by the closing date is no more than sufficient to fill the vacancies, the candidates nominated shall be deemed to be duly elected

as of the close of the nomination period on Thursday 30 October. When required, places will be allocated according to academic standing, as defined in [Council Regulations 22 of 2002, Part 2: Academic Precedence and Standing](#). If the number of nominations received by the closing date is less than sufficient to fill the vacancies, those candidates nominated will be deemed elected unopposed, and the remaining vacancies will lapse, in which case, in accordance with the regulations, the places must remain vacant until appointments are made jointly by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors.

Period of office

In accordance with [Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002](#), in any election where vacancies are to be filled for periods of different length, the elected candidates shall hold office so that the tenure of those who receive more votes shall be longer than that of those who receive fewer votes; but if the election is uncontested or if two candidates receive the same number of votes, the candidate senior in academic standing shall hold office for the longer period.
