1 Changes to Regulations

Council has made the following changes to regulations to come into effect on **2 August**, unless notice of a resolution calling upon

Council to annul or amend the regulation is received by the Registrar by **noon on 29 July** (as set out in <u>Statute VI:</u> Council).

(a) Regulations for Committees Reporting Directly to Council or One of Its Main Committees Part 18: Committee to Review Donations and Research Funding

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made to reflect recent changes to senior leadership following the abolition of the role of Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Development and External Affairs) and strengthening of due diligence activities in support of the Committee to Review Donations and Research Funding around Donor Advised Funds

Text of Regulations

In <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002, Part 18</u>, concerning the Committee to Review Donations and Research Funding, amend section 18 (5) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'18.5. Subject to the guidelines made under regulation 18.3 (1), a donation shall only be accepted if the identity of the donor is known and acceptable to the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Development and External Affairs) Chief Development and Alumni Engagement Officer, except in the case of use of intermediaries (including Donor Advised Funds), where the sponsor is a wellknown reputable institution who confirms to the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Development and External Affairs) where the identity of the donor should be known and acceptable to both the Chair of the CRDRF and the Chief Development and Alumni Engagement Officerin writing that the donor is known to the institution well enough for it, as part of the written confirmation, to confirm that no ethical questions, of the type set out in the guidelines made under regulation 18.3 (1), arise in relation to the donor?

(b) Regulations for Strategic Capital Steering Group and the Planning and Housing Strategy Group

Explanatory Note

Following approval of the merger of the Strategic Capital Steering Group (SCSG) and the Planning and Housing Strategy Group (PHSG), approval is now being sought to reflect the merged membership in regulations.

Text of Regulations

1 Delete <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002, Part 35</u>, concerning the Planning and Housing Strategy Group.

2 In <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002, Part 12</u>, concerning the Strategic Capital Steering Group, amend section 12.1 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'12.1. The Strategic Capital Steering Group shall consist of:

(1) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources) who shall chair the Group;

(2)–(5) the heads of each of the divisions;

(6) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Education);

(7) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Research);

(8) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (People and Digital);

(9)(6) the Head of Gardens, Libraries and Museums (GLAM);

(7) the Chair of BESC;

(8) the Chair of Information and Digital Committee;

(10),(11)(9)–(11) three two external members appointed by Council, not being members of the Audit and Scrutiny Committee;

(12) the Chief Financial Officer (or their nominee);

(13) one of the Proctors or the Assessor as may be agreed between them;

(14) one Estates Bursar (nominated by the Estates Bursars Committee);

(15) an early career researcher, appointed by the Oxford Research Staff Society; and

(16) the Group may co-opt an academic member of staff who is a member of Congregation.'

(c) Regulations for Buildings and Estate Subcommittee

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made following a review of the Buildings Estate Subcommittee and estate-related governance under the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee.

Text of Regulations

In <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002, Part 10</u>, concerning the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee, amend as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

- '10.1. The Buildings and Estates Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee shall consist of:
 - (1) a Chair, who shall be appointed by Council, who shall also serve on the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee of Council;
 - (2) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources);
 - (3)–(6) one person appointed by each of the divisional boards Heads of Division;
 - (7) the Director of University Library Services and Bodley's Librarian or a person nominated by the director;
 - (8) a person appointed by the Gardens, Libraries and Museums Board from among the directors of the University's museums;
 - (9) the Chief Finance Officer or nominee;
 - (910), (1011) two persons elected by Congregation;
 - (11) one sabbatical trustee of Oxford University Student Union.
- 10.2. The subcommittee may co-opt up to two additional members, who may be external.
- 10.3. (1) The subcommittee shall be responsible to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee for management and maintenance of the <u>University</u> functional estate (including the functional estate, green estate and other residential and investment property held and managed by the <u>University</u>), except for matters which are the responsibility of divisions, and other bodies.
 - (2) The functional estate is defined as universityowned or leased land and property occupied by university bodies and excludes investment property and property which is the responsibility of the Property Management Subcommittee.

(3) The Planning and Resource Allocation Committee shall make delegations to the subcommittee to take decisions, and the subcommittee shall consider and make recommendations to the committee on estates matters outside its delegation.

(4) The Registrar shall appoint the Director of Estates and University Surveyor to act as the chief executive officer of the subcommittee.

10.4. (1) In particular, the subcommittee shall:

ESTATE MANAGEMENT

(a) consider and advise the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on the allocation of land and property in the functional estate, ensuring allocations align with University approved masterplans and institutional plans;

(b) monitor and advise the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on matters relating to the condition of the University estate oversee the repairs and maintenance programmes undertaken by the Director of Estates and University Surveyor;

(c) supervise the leasing of residential and investment property held by the University;

(d) make proposals to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on the acquisition and disposal of property within the estate, except the purchase of land for development within the remit of the Strategic Capital Steering Group;

(e) make recommendations to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on the annual budgets for the residential and investment property held by the University;

(f) the Subcommittee shall obtain external valuation advice concerning any purchase or sale transaction in excess of £750,000;

(c) consider and recommend to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee proposals for the development and masterplanning of the functional estate, taking into account institutional plans, sustainability, planning and heritage issues;

CAPITAL PROJECTS

(dg) oversee the management and construction of all capital projects funded by the University, within pre_approved financial limits, including the establishment of Project Boards;

(eh) consider reports from Projects Boards submitted to it by the Programme Board; (fi) consider local planning consultations and related governmental policy changes affecting the University estate and make proposals to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on the University responses where appropriate; (j) assess benefits realisation on capital projects and use feedback to inform recommendations on guidelines and policies for capital projects planning and delivery;

PLANNING SUBMISSIONS AND CONSULTATIONS

(gk) approve submissions for planning and listed building consent (excluding Joint Venture developments);

(h) oversee the management and maintenance of University controlled car parks;

ESTATE STRATEGY

(il) <u>oversee the development</u> and recommend to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee proposals for the Estate Strategy. <u>Monitor the</u> <u>implementation of the Estate Strategy</u>;

OTHER MATTERS

(m) oversee the management and maintenance of University-controlled car parks and, following consultation with People Committee, approve charges for parking in University controlled car parks.

(2) The subcommittee shall establish and keep under review guidelines and policies issue regulations for the management, maintenance of, and all works in, buildings on the functional University estate, and for University-controlled car parks.'

(d) Regulations for Environmental Sustainability Subcommittee

Explanatory Note

The following change has been made following a review of the Buildings Estate Subcommittee and estate-related governance under the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, and supports reducing the number of committee commitments held by the Chair of Buildings and Estates Subcommittee.

Text of Regulations

In <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002</u>, <u>Part 36</u>, concerning Environmental Sustainability Subcommittee, amend section 36.1 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'36.1. The Environmental Sustainability Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee shall consist of:

(8) the Chair of the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;

(98)–(1112) one representative of each of the academic divisions with relevant expertise, appointed by the head of each division, respectively;

(1213) a representative of Gardens, Libraries and Museums with relevant expertise, appointed by the Head of Gardens, Libraries and Museums;

(1314) a representative from the Department for Continuing Education with relevant expertise, appointed by the director of the department;

(1415) a representative of the Conference of Colleges, elected by the Conference of Colleges; and

(1516) one sabbatical trustee of the Oxford University Student Union.'

(e) Regulations concerning the Rupert Murdoch Professor in Language and Communication

Explanatory Note

The following change is to amend the title of the post in order to attract the widest range of candidates. This aligns with changes made to the section of Council Regulations 24 of 2002 governing the Rupert Murdoch Professorship of Language and Communication.

Text of Regulations

In <u>Council Regulations 3 of 2004</u>, concerning the Employment of University Staff, amend Table 6: Schedule of Statutory Professorships as follows:

Delete 'Rupert Murdoch Professor of Language and Communication' and substitute 'Professor of Language and Communication, endowed by News UK'.

(f) Regulations for Senior Remuneration Committee

Explanatory Note

Amendments are proposed to the regulations relating to the Senior Remuneration Committee in order to (i) accommodate representation from a Head of House in the membership of the committee; (ii) clarify that the remuneration packages are set and reviewed for senior officers covered by the committee; and (iii) extend the remit of the committee to include the salary setting and review of the Head of Gardens, Libraries and Museums (GLAM).

Text of Regulations

In <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002</u>, amend Part 28, relating to the Senior Remuneration Committee, as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'28.1. The Senior Remuneration Committee shall consist of:

- (1)–(3) three external members appointed by Council, one of whom Council shall appoint as chair, and at least two one of whom shall also be an external members of Council, and one of whom will be Chair/Deputy Chair of Conference (ex officio);
- (4) one of the Proctors or the Assessor as may be agreed between them;
- (5) one member of Congregation appointed by Council from among its elected members;
- (6) one external member appointed by Council with experience of remuneration;
- (7) one external member appointed by Council with experience of people and culture.
- 28.2 Council may co-opt one additional member, who may be internal or external.
- 28.3 Members will serve a maximum of two terms (3 years each term), lasting no more than 6 years, with no part terms or repeated terms after a gap.
- 28.4 For the purpose of regulation 28.1 (1)–(3) and 28.2 "external member" may include a college-only post-holder. Up to three Heads of House may be members of the Committee at any one time, one of whom will be Chair/Deputy Chair of Conference (ex officio) and the remaining two to be appointed by Council and have experience relevant to senior remuneration.
- 28.45 The members under regulations 28.1 (6), 28.1 (7), and 28.2 shall not be subject to arrangements with regard to their personal salary which are determined

by any process involving an individual whose salary is covered by the remit of the committee.

- 28.56 (1) The committee shall be responsible for making recommendations to Council on the remuneration packages on appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, the Registrar, and the Chief Financial Officer and for any increases arising from salary reviews thereafter. Salaries of each of those office-holders will be reviewed with effect from the 1 October closest to two calendar years after the starting salaries were set for each office-holder; and for reviewing the salaries of each office-holder every two years thereafter. As part of the recruitment process for these roles, Council will be consulted at an early stage to discuss agree proposed ranges of remuneration levels.
 - (2) The committee shall also be responsible for determining the salaries remuneration packages on appointment of the Pro-Vice-Chancellors with special responsibility for designated functions, the Heads of Divisions, the Head of Gardens, Libraries and Museums and the Dean of the Business School; for reviewing the salaries of each of those office-holders with effect from the 1 October closest to two calendar years after the starting salaries were set for each office-holder; and for reviewing the salaries of each office-holder every two years thereafter.

Council will approve remuneration boundaries for salary reviews which will be re-visited at each review. Salaries of all senior post-holders, subject to the Senior Remuneration Committee, will be disclosed in the Senior Remuneration Committee's annual report to Council.

- (3) The committee shall also carry out other such reviews as are requested by Council.
- 28.67 In carrying out reviews the committee shall consider whether there have been any significant changes in the duties of, or any significant developments associated with, the offices concerned since the salaries of the holders of the offices were last determined; and ensure that the views of the office-holders concerned and the views of the officers to whom those office-holders are responsible have been solicited. Office-holders shall be given explanation of the decisions taken if they request it.
- 28.78 The committee will be reviewed every three years to ensure it remains effective and review outcomes reported to Council.'

2 Changes to Regulations

Regulations for People Committee

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made to amend the regulations so that the four positions for divisional representatives become *ex officio* positions for the Associate Heads (People) from each of the four divisions.

Text of Regulations

In <u>Council Regulations 15 of 2002</u>, concerning People Committee, amend 4.1 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

- '4.1. The People Committee shall consist of:
 - (1) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor with responsibility for People, who shall chair the committee;

- (2) one member of Council appointed by Council;
- (3)–(5) the Proctors and the Assessor;
- (6) the Chair of the Committee of Senior Tutors;
- (7)–(10) the heads of each of the divisions;
- (11) one external member appointed by Council;
- (12)–(15) one person the Associate Head (People) appointed by from each of the divisional boards.'

Congregation 25 June

A meeting of Congregation was held on 25 June, which included voting on two resolutions:

(1) To continue to require the graduate application fee from those who do not meet our access criteria and for all of this income to be used for graduate access initiatives and scholarships.

(See Gazette No 5424, 6 June 2024, p513.)

This resolution was **carried** (votes in favour: 142, votes against: 138). A flysheet is published on the <u>Congregation Meeting webpage</u> and with this issue (<u>Flysheet 1:</u> <u>Graduate Application Fee</u>).

(2) That a Redundancy Panel be constituted to consider whether to recommend dismissal by reason of redundancy in respect of one member of staff under the jurisdiction of Statute XII but who is not required or undertakes in their role academic teaching or research.

POSTAL VOTE

As allowed by Congregation regulations, requests have been made for a postal vote. In line with the contemporary approach, voting will be electronic and Civica will administer both votes on behalf of the University of Oxford.

Congregation 15 October

Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XI: University Discipline and consequential amendments to Statute IX concerning Officers of the University and Statute XII concerning Academic Staff and the Visitatorial Board

Following receipt of opposition to this legislative proposal (see *Gazette* No 5424, p512, 6 June 2024), a proposed amendment to the resolution was published (*Gazette* No 5426, p543, 20 June 2024). This proposed amendment has now been withdrawn, and substituted by the following proposed amendment. For the full text of the original legislative proposal see *Gazette* No 5422, p465, 23 May 2024.

Explanatory Note

'The resolution outlines the establishment of a working group to recommend revisions to the legislative proposal for amendments to Statute XI (Paragraph 2). The group should be "comprised of relevant university officials, representatives of the Conference of Colleges, and no less than five elected members of Congregation."

We propose amendments to (a) the process by which Congregation members join the working group; (b) the composition of the group; (c) the workings of the group.

- (a) The requirements of Congregations Regulations 2 of 2002, which include arrangements for, respectively, voting and elections of members of Committees by Congregation are such that there is no guarantee that Congregation elections would happen in Michaelmas Term 2024. This might further delay long-awaited reforms to the University's handling of sexual violence cases. Appointments by Divisional Boards (which represent all departments within divisions) can be made in Michaelmas Term. Calls for expressions of interest would provide an opportunity for those invested in the issue and with relevant experience or expertise (see below) to put forward their names and increase the likelihood of a gathered field.
- (b) We propose two changes to the composition of the group:
- Experience and expertise. In view of the complexity of the issues, the Congregation members should bring relevant experience and expertise to the work of the Working Group. There is precedent for such a requirement in a number of University committees.
- Representativeness. The resolution does not stipulate that the representatives of Conference should themselves be Congregation members. We suggest they should. As it is important to keep the group at a reasonable size to ensure agile decision-making, we propose that Conference appoint only one such person. Moreover, in view of concerns raised by students about the proposed amendments to Statute XI, the

Working Group should include a student representative appointed by the Student Union.

(c) The resolution does not direct the Working Group to consult widely with academics, professional services and students. Such consultations would better inform its recommendations.'

Amendment

'That a university working group shall be convened to recommend revisions to the proposal for amendments to Statute XI previously submitted to Congregation for a meeting on 11 June 2024, so that the proposal can be implemented subject to those revisions. This work should begin in MT2024. The Working Group shall include relevant university officials, a student appointed by the Student Union, and five members of Congregation (one appointed by Conference of Colleges and four appointed by each of the four divisional boards from within their own division) who will bring relevant experience and expertise to the Working Group (for example, experience of student welfare, disciplinary processes, expertise in human rights law and in legislation relating to freedom of expression and academic freedom). Appointments shall be made at the earliest opportunity in MT 2024 following a call for expressions of interest. The Working Group shall consult widely with members of academic staff and professional services, as well as students, to help inform their recommendations. It shall then submit an amended legislative proposal for changes to Statute XI to Education Committee, General Purposes Committee and Council. Noting that this work may usefully be combined with that needed to implement the OfS Regulatory Guidance on Freedom of Speech, but that it is not yet known when that guidance will be available, the remit of the Working Group shall include consideration of the legal context within which Statute XI operates including: (i) all relevant law, including but not limited to the Human Rights Act 1998, the Education (no. 2) Act 1986, the Equality Act 2010, and the Higher Education (Freedom of Speech) Act 2023, as well as associated domestic and international case law and (ii) the protections and rights that this university has extended to its faculty, staff, and/ or students in previous resolutions of Congregation, including but not limited to academic freedom as defined in the Statute XII reference to the UNESCO Recommendation.'

Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council

ALL SOULS COLLEGE

Revised Statutes

The Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council, acting under authority delegated to it by Council, is minded to give consent on behalf of the University to the revised statutes of All Souls College, approved by the Governing Body on 8 June 2024, in so far as such consent is required by section 7 (2) of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923. The consent of the committee to the amendments to the statutes will be effective 15 days after publication of this notice unless written notice of a resolution, signed by at least 20 members of Congregation, calling upon Council to withhold that consent, has been given to the Registrar by **noon on 29 July**.

The changes have (i) made a number of expository and stylistic changes to (eg) the removal of use of gendered pronouns, redundant or overly specific clauses, incorrect cross-references, etc; (ii) removed clauses stipulating some Fellows' privileges, conditions for eligibility to Fellowship, and so on, where it is considered that those provisions are best made through College By-Laws or Policies; (iii) updated clauses which refer to outdated practices and procedures; (iv) removed the reference to a specific EJRA of 67, to allow the college to regulate by By-Law a normal retirement date; and (v) given statutory footing to three committees: General Purposes Committee, Audit Committee and Remuneration Committee.

Medical Sciences Division/Education Committee

REVIEW OF THE NUFFIELD DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE

The Medical Sciences Board and the Education Committee of Council will jointly undertake a review of the Nuffield Department of Medicine as part of Council's programme of rolling reviews of faculties and departments. The review will take place on 2 and 3 October 2024 and will be chaired by the Head of Division, Professor Gavin Screaton. A copy of the terms of reference for the review is set out below.

Terms of Reference of the Review Committee

1 The purpose of the departmental review is to consider and make an assessment of the following aspects

of departmental organisation and performance by reference to:

- planning statements at department and divisional level, and in the context of the University's Mission Statement and Strategic Plan and available data;
- international standards of excellence and funder expectations/requirements;
- action taken since the last review of the department;

In particular:

(a) the organisation of the department, its management structures and the relationship between

the department and the division and the University's services, including such matters as:

- the structure of the department and the efficacy
 of the structure, including the relationship
 (structural and operational) between units
 within the department, and externally to
 the department and the functioning of the
 department as a single cohesive entity;
- departmental leadership;
- departmental governance;
- strategic planning (including relationship to the divisional five-year plans and the University's Strategic Plan);
- internal collaboration;
- external collaboration:
- staffing level, staff planning and recruitment (academic and professional services staff);
- staff experience and culture including Equality, Diversity and Inclusion activities and their effectiveness).

(b) the quality of the research of the department, including its participation in inter-department, inter-divisional and inter-disciplinary activities, its research profile and strategy, and future challenges and opportunities, including:

New Freedom of Speech legislation

The Higher Education (Freedom of Speech) Act brings new requirements to universities, with most provisions coming into force from 1 August 2024.

A collegiate University-wide consultation with University committees and colleges has taken place during Hilary and Trinity term to consider Oxford's response to this legislation. As a result of this work, and in line with requirements included in the Act, University Council has approved:

- A Code of Practice on Freedom of Speech
- A complaints procedure in case of breaches of the University's duties under freedom of speech legislation.

These documents can be found online. The new Code reflects the University's existing Statement on Freedom of Speech (https://compliance.admin.ox.ac.uk/freedom-of-speech), and amalgamates and replaces

- research strategy
- research environment and culture
- research income
- commercialisation and impact of research activities

(c) the quality of undergraduate and graduate programmes (Postgraduate Taught and Postgraduate Research) and their delivery and related issues, including:

- · access, admissions and outcomes;
- · teaching, learning and assessment;
