The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **6 December**, unless notice of a resolution calling

(a) Subak (Heberden Coin Room) Fund

Explanatory Note

The following regulations are made to set out the terms of new trust arising from the receipt of a legacy endowment gift for the benefit of the Heberden Coin Room in the Ashmolean Museum.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 25 of 2002](#), concerning Trusts, insert:

‘Subak (Heberden Coin Room) Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude the bequest of Carl Subak to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. The assets so held will be known as the Subak (Heberden Coin Room) Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the Fund, for the benefit of the Heberden Coin Room (“the Coin Room”) in the Ashmolean Museum, except that the fund shall not be used for routine maintenance of the Coin Room.

3. Until 30 June 2095, the Fund shall have two distinct purposes:

- (1) the first \$2m of the bequest shall be ringfenced for the acquisition of coins and medals for the Coin Room;
- (2) the remainder of the bequest shall be ringfenced for numismatic research.

4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Director of the Ashmolean Museum with advice sought from the Keeper of the Heberden Coin Room and accountable to the Executive Management Group of the Ashmolean Museum.

(b) Uehiro Oxford Institute Fund*Explanatory Note*

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gifts from the Uehiro Foundation on Ethics and Education.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 25 of 2002](#), concerning Trusts, insert:

‘Uehiro Oxford Institute Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts from The Uehiro Foundation on Ethics and Education to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Uehiro Oxford Institute Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards any and all costs of the Uehiro Oxford Institute, and associated activities.

9. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

10. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.

11. Regulations 1–5 and 7–13 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

12. Subject to regulation 13, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

(e) Brettschneider Bursary Fund

‘Brettschneider Bursary Fund

The University accepts with gratitude from Mr Michael Borkan, the sum of £16,200, and such further sums as shall be contributed for the same purpose, to establish a fund to be known as the Brettschneider Fund to strengthen links between the University of Oxford and Cornell University. The net income of the Fund shall be applied to promote academic exchange, including the

provision of bursaries for present or former students of Cornell University to study in Oxford.

2. The fund shall be administered by a Board of Management the membership of which shall consist of the Board of the Astor Travel Fund, afforded by a person appointed by the Senior Tutors and Graduates Committee of the Conference of Colleges:

(f) Professorship of Civil Engineering

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division and the Department of Engineering Science, update outdated wording in the regulations, including setting out the expectation that the Professor undertakes research.

Voting on a Resolution authorising the allocation of space in New Radcliffe House to the Department of Experimental Psychology

Explanatory Note

The Department of Experimental Psychology currently occupies approximately 2,118 sqm net usable area within New Radcliffe House on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter, with the department's current allocation set to expire on 20 April 2025. This space requirement arises from the ongoing construction and subsequent fit-out of the Life and Mind Building (LaMB), which is currently anticipated to reach practical completion in March 2025. Replacing the demolished Tinbergen Building, LaMB will eventually house the Departments of Biology and Experimental Psychology, and part of Biochemistry. The relocation of the Department of Experimental Psychology to LaMB is scheduled to follow fit-out works in the three months following practical completion. The requested extension will provide a buffer to accommodate the fit-out phase and any unforeseen delays.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 2,118 sqm NUA within New Radcliffe House be allocated to the Department of Experimental Psychology for an ongoing period of approximately three months, from 21 April 2025 until 31 July 2025, or until completion of and relocation to the Life and Mind Building, if sooner.

VOTING ARRANGEMENTS

A first round of voting took place at a Convocation in the week commencing 28 October for the purpose of electing a Chancellor.

As outlined on the Chancellor’s election webpage (www.ox.ac.uk/about/organisation/university-officers/chancellor/chancellor-election), this election uses the Alternative Vote system, whereby voters can rank as many of the candidates as they choose. Lower-ranking candidates have now been eliminated; 5 candidates remain. These 5 candidates (listed below in alphabetical order) are going forward to a second round, to take place during Week 6 of Michaelmas term (week commencing 18 November). The first candidate to achieve 50% of the vote following the second round will be elected Chancellor.

The election is taking place online only and is administered by Civica. The election is conducted in accordance with the provisions of Council Regulations 8 of 2002 (*Gazette No 5421, pp440–1*); these regulations are available on the University website at: <https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/legislation/council-regulations-8-of-2002>. Registered voters will receive an email directly from Civica with a link to cast their vote for the second round.

The new Chancellor will be announced during Week 7 (week commencing 25 November).

THE CHANCELLORSHIP

Statutory provision

[Statute IX, sections 2–5](#), provides as follows.

‘2. The Chancellor shall be elected by Convocation and shall hold office for a fixed period decided by Council or until their resignation.

3. There shall be a Chancellor’s Court of Benefactors to membership of which the Chancellor may from time to time admit major benefactors of the University.

4. The Chancellor shall have such other functions and powers as are assigned to them by the statutes and regulations or by the law of the land.

5. In the event of the incapacity or absence abroad of the Chancellor, or during a vacancy in the Chancellorship, or on delegation from the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor may exercise any of the functions and powers of the Chancellor, except where the statutes provide otherwise.’

STATEMENT ON THE CHARACTERISTICS OF A CHANCELLOR

For the guidance of candidates and electors

The Chancellor is the ceremonial head of the University of Oxford. While this key role has no executive responsibilities, it is more than symbolic; the Chancellor provides supportive and useful advice and guidance to the University, particularly to the Vice-Chancellor. The Chancellor presides at events such as Encaenia and at the Chancellor’s Court of Benefactors and is sometimes expected to take a leading role at other official events. The Chancellor is the Visitor (an external figure of authority on whom the college can call for advice and for arbitration if insoluble dispute arises among its governing body) of five colleges and also chairs the Committee for the Nomination of the Vice-Chancellor. In addition to these formal duties, the Chancellor undertakes advocacy, advisory and fundraising work, acting as an ambassador for the University at a range of local, national and international events. The Chancellor

must be readily accessible and available throughout the year.

The University is seeking a candidate who can demonstrate:

1. outstanding achievements in their field and the ability to command respect beyond it;
2. a deep appreciation for the University’s research and academic mission, its global community, and its ambition to remain a world-class research and teaching university;
3. the ability and willingness to enhance the reputation of the University locally, nationally and abroad.

CANDIDATE LIST

Following elimination of lower-ranking candidates during the first round of voting, 5 candidates go forward to a second round of voting.

Candidates have been considered by the Chancellor’s Election Committee solely against the specific exclusion criteria as laid out in [Part 7 of Council Regulations 8 of 2002](#), with no subjective selection process.
