General Purposes Committee of Council

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **10 December**.

(a) Establishment of the Professorship of Molecular Immunology

Explanatory Note

These changes, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Board, establish a new professorship of molecular immunology.

Text of Regulations

1 In the Schedule of Statutory Professorships annexed to Council Regulations 3 of 2004, insert:

'Professor of Molecular Immunology'

2 In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, insert:

'Professor of Molecular Immunology

1. The Professor of Molecular Immunology shall undertake research in Molecular Immunology and shall lecture and give instruction in this subject.

2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;

(2) the head of the college to which the professorship may be allocated by Council from time to time; or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in paragraph (2) above;

(4)-(5) two persons appointed by Council;

(6)-(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board.

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.

(b) Associate Professor in Jewish History

Explanatory Note

These changes are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gift from Mr Henry Sacher and his family.

Text of Regulations

1 In Council regulations 24 of 2002, delete the section concerning the Reader in Jewish Studies.

2 In Council regulations 25 of 2002, insert the following:

'Associate Professor in Jewish History Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude funds to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Associate Professor in Jewish History Fund ("the Fund").

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund for the advancement of education for the benefit of the public by establishing and maintaining a post that shall be called the Associate Professor in Jewish History ("the Associate Professor"). 4. The Associate Professor shall undertake research and teaching in the literature, history, social life and religion of the Jews from 200 BC to AD 1500.

5. The Fund shall be used to pay the salary and expenses of the Associate Professor and associated overheads. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Associate Professor are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the income of the Fund to support the Associate Professor's research; to make acquisitions of items to support the work of the Associate Professor; or to support the work of the Associate Professor in any other manner.

6. The Associate Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of Associate Professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this post.

7. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Humanities Divisional Board.

8. The University shall have power to pay out of the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund and the post.

9. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

10. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

11. Subject to regulation 12, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

Congregation

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

12. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(c) Professorship of Linguistics

Explanatory Note

These changes, made on the recommendation of the Humanities Division and the Board of the Faculty of Linguistics, Philology and Phonetics, amend the regulations governing the Professor of Linguistics to include research in the duties of the professor.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend the Professorship of Linguistics as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'Professor of Linguistics

1. The Professor of Linguistics shall <u>undertake research and teaching</u> lecture and give instruction in the field of Linguistics and shall promote the study of that subject in the University.

2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

(2) the head of the college to which the professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any decree in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;

(4)-(5) two persons appointed by Council;

(6) (8) three persons appointed by the Humanities Board;

(9) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Modern-Languages.

(6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or their nominee;

(7)-(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Linguistics, Philology and Phonetics.

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the <u>regulations</u>decree concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same <u>regulations</u>decree which are applicable to this chair.'
