(a) Khalid bin Abdullah Al Saud Professor for the Study of the Contemporary Arab World

Explanatory Note

These changes are to include research in the duties of the professor and update the membership of the electoral board, including outdated naming.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend the Khalid bin Abdullah Al Saud Professor for the Study of the Contemporary Arab World as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'Al Saud Professor for the Study of the Contemporary Arab World

- 1. The Khalid bin Abdullah Al Saud Professor for the Study of the Contemporary Arab World shall <u>undertake research and teaching lecture and give instruction</u> in one or more aspects of the contemporary Arab world.
- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the President of Magdalen College is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion:
 - (2) the President of Magdalen College, or, if the President is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the

Governing Body of Magdalen College on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

(3) a person appointed by the Governing Body of Magdalen College;

(4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;

(4) a person appointed by Council, in consultation with the Board of the Faculty of Oriental Studies;

(5) a person appointed by Council, in consultation with the Social Sciences Board;

(6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee:

(7)–(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies;

(7), (8) two persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Oriental Studies;

(9) a person appointed by the Social Sciences Board.

- 3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.
- 4. Any part of the income of the endowment of the professorship which is not required to meet the costs thereof may be expended, under conditions to be determined from time to time by the General Board, on the provision of grants to the professor for travelling and other expenses incurred in the pursuance of his or her studies.'

(b) Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made to update the electoral board composition to remove from the electoral board the specific reference to the WA Handley Professor of Psychiatry and the Faculty of Clinical Medicine (in line with the contemporary approach to regulations governing electoral boards in the Medical Sciences Division), and to include research in the duties of the professor. The opportunity is also being taken to update outdated references.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend the Professorship of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry

- (6)–(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;
- (10) a person holding a clinical appointment appointed by the Oxford Health NHS Foundation Trust.

- (10) a person holding a clinical appointment appointed by the Oxfordshire Health Authority. At least three members of the board, of whom one shall be a professor, shall hold clinical appointments.
- <u>3. At least three members of the board, of whom one shall be a professor, shall hold clinical appointments.</u>
- 34. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the <u>decree regulations</u> concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same <u>decree regulations</u> which are applicable to this chair.'

'Professor of Inorganic Chemistry

- 1. The Professor of Inorganic Chemistry shall <u>undertake</u> <u>research in and shall</u> lecture and give instruction in Inorganic Chemistry <u>and shall generally promote its study in the University</u>.
- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

(2) the head of the college to which the professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any regulation in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;

(4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;

(6)–(9) four persons appointed by the Mathematical and Physical, and Life Sciences Board;

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the decree regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same decree regulations which are applicable to this chair.'

(f) Brost Lecturer in German and European Community Law

Explanatory Note

These changes remove a provision that is no longer applicable and replace outdated terminology.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend the Brost Lecturer in German and European Community Law (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'4. Before 31 December each year, beginning in December 1996, the University shall pay from the income of the fund such sum, being initially D.M.4,000, as the Stiftverband may reasonably require to cover the Stiftverband's administrative costs in connection with the lecturership.

5. 4. Council shall have power to amend this decree these regulations from time to time, provided always that it may do so only with the Stiftverband's prior written agreement. In the event that the University no longer complies with the provisions of clauses 1–4 regulations 1–3 above, or with any new provisions which may be effective from time to time as a result of amendments made in accordance with such agreement, the University shall return to the Stiftverband both the capital of the fund and any income to the fund which has not already been expended or committed by the University.'

The full term of office is four years (or less, when a by-election is held to fill the residue of the term of office for an elected member who is standing down early).

Participation on the board offers members the opportunity to participate in divisional decision making and to collaborate with other colleagues across the division and the wider university. Members are expected to prepare for the meeting and to contribute to topics of discussion and to decision making; members may also propose items for the board's agenda. Uncontested elections

If the number of nominations received by the closing date is no more than sufficient to fill the vacancies, the candidates nominated shall be deemed to be duly elected as of the close of the nomination period on Thursday 26 October. When required, places will be allocated according to academic standing, as defined in Council Regulations 22 of 2002, Part 2: Academic Precedence and Standing. If the number of nominations received by the closing date is less than sufficient to fill the vacancies, those candidates nominated will be deemed elected unopposed, and the remaining vacancies will lapse, in which case, in accordance with the regulations, the places must remain vacant until appointments are made jointly by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors.

Period of office

All vacancies are with immediate effect unless otherwise stated. In accordance with <u>Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002</u>, in any election where vacancies are to be filled for periods of different length, the elected candidates shall hold office so that the tenure of those who receive more votes shall be longer than that of those who receive fewer votes; but if the election is uncontested or if two candidates receive the same number of votes, the candidate senior in academic standing shall hold office for the longer period.
