Council of the University

Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **4 October**, unless notice of a resolution calling upon Council to annul or amend

the regulation is received by the Registrar by **noon on 7 October** (as set out in Statute VI: Council).

(a) Regulations for Planning and Resource Allocation Committee

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made following a review of the Buildings Estate Subcommittee and estate-related governance under the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. The Buildings and Estates Subcommittee will be given responsibility for approving charges for parking in University-controlled car parks and the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee will be responsible for approving annual rent increases for University-held graduate accommodation (previously in the remit of Property Management Subcommittee).

Text of Regulations

In <u>Part 5 of Council Regulations 15 of 2002</u>, concerning the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, amend section 5.4 (17) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'5.4. The committee shall be responsible for monitoring and implementing the University's Strategic Plan, setting its annual budget, and resource allocation. In particular, it shall be responsible for the following matters:

...

OTHER MATTERS

(17) on the recommendation of the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee, and following consultation with People Committee, the approval of charges for parking in University-controlled car parks review and approve annual rent increases for University graduate accommodation.'

(b) Regulations for Estate Investment Subgroup

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made following a review of the Buildings Estate Subcommittee (BESC) and estate-related governance under the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC). The Estate Investment Subgroup will become a Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. The Subcommittee will retain responsibility for making recommendations to PRAC on leases within the functional estate and responsibility for making recommendations on acquisitions and disposals within the functional estate will be assigned to BESC.

Text of Regulations

In <u>Part 11 of Council Regulations 15 of 2002</u>, concerning the Estate Investment Subgroup, amend as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'Part 11: Estate Investment <u>Subgroup</u>Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee

11.1. The Estate Investment <u>Subgroup</u> <u>Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee</u> shall consist of:

11.2. The Estate Investment Subgroup Subcommittee shallbe a subgroup of the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee. It will:

(1) agree the repairs and maintenance programme on behalf of the subcommittee;

(2) make regular reports to the subcommittee on the repairs and maintenance programmes ubmit an annual report to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee and report as required on other matters.

11.3. Tethe subgroupsubcommittee shall report directly to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on the management of the Minor Capital Plan, which is defined in accordance with the financial limits set out in the Financial Regulations (i.e. excluding those within remit of the Strategic Capital Steering Group (SCSG) or the IT Committee). It will:

11.4. Consider and make proposals to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on the acquisition, leasing, and disposal of land and property within the functional estate, except the purchase of land for development within the remit of the Strategic Capital Steering Group.'

...

(c) Regulations for Property Management Subcommittee

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made following a review of the Buildings Estate Subcommittee and estate-related governance under the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC). It is proposed to dis-establish the Property Management Subcommittee. The responsibilities of the subcommittee will be reassigned within existing governance structures, transferring mainly to the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee. PRAC will approve rents in University graduate accommodation.

Text of Regulations

Delete Part 27 of Council Regulations 15 of 2002, concerning Property Management Subcommittee.

Congregation 25 June

(1) Resolution in Respect of the Reinstatement of the Graduate Application Fee

A debate and a vote on a resolution to reinstate the graduate application fee took place at the Congregation meeting on 25 June. The text of the resolution is: 'to continue to require a graduate application fee from those who do not meet our access criteria, for all this income to be used for graduate access initiatives and scholarships'.

At the meeting the resolution was carried. A postal vote was called on the resolution and the results are as follows:

For: 1,505; Against: 440.

The result confirms the outcome of the vote at the Congregation meeting on 25 June and the resolution is accordingly carried. Further information is available on the Congregation website.

(2) Resolution to constitute a Redundancy Panel under Statute XII

A debate and a vote on a resolution to constitute a redundancy panel under Statute XII took place at the Congregation meeting on 25 June. A transcript of this part of the meeting can be found in Supplement (1) to Gazette No 5428, 4 July 2024, p591. The text of the resolution is: 'that a Redundancy Panel be constituted to consider whether to recommend dismissal by reason of redundancy in respect of one member of staff under the jurisdiction of Statute XII but who is not required or undertakes in their role academic teaching or research'.

At the meeting the resolution was rejected. A postal vote was called on the resolution and the results are as follows:

For: 936; Against: 893.

Congregation 15 October

Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XI: University Discipline and consequential amendments to Statute IX concerning Officers of the University and Statute XII concerning Academic Staff and the Visitatorial Board

Following receipt of opposition to this legislative proposal (see *Gazette* No 5424, p512, 6 June 2024), a proposed amendment to the resolution was published (*Gazette* No 5426, p543, 20 June 2024). This proposed amendment has now been withdrawn, and substituted by the following proposed amendment. For the full text of the original legislative proposal see *Gazette* No 5422, p465, 23 May 2024.

Explanatory Note

'The resolution outlines the establishment of a working group to recommend revisions to the legislative proposal for amendments to Statute XI (Paragraph 2). The group should be "comprised of relevant university officials, representatives of the Conference of Colleges, and no less than five elected members of Congregation."

We propose amendments to (a) the process by which Congregation members join the working group; (b) the composition of the group; (c) the workings of the group.

- (a) The requirements of Congregations Regulations 2 of 2002, which include arrangements for, respectively, voting and elections of members of Committees by Congregation are such that there is no guarantee that Congregation elections would happen in Michaelmas Term 2024. This might further delay long-awaited reforms to the University's handling of sexual violence cases. Appointments by Divisional Boards (which represent all departments within divisions) can be made in Michaelmas term. Calls for expressions of interest would provide an opportunity for those invested in the issue and with relevant experience or expertise (see below) to put forward their names and increase the likelihood of a gathered field.
- (b) We propose two changes to the composition of the group:
- Experience and expertise. In view of the complexity of the issues, the Congregation members should bring relevant experience and expertise to the work of the Working Group. There is precedent for such a requirement in a number of University committees.
- Representativeness. The resolution does not stipulate that the representatives of Conference should themselves be Congregation members. We suggest they should. As it is important to keep the group at a reasonable size to ensure agile decision-making, we propose that Conference appoint only one such person. Moreover, in view of concerns raised by students about the proposed amendments to Statute XI, the Working Group should include a student representative appointed by the Student Union.
- (c) The resolution does not direct the Working Group to consult widely with academics, professional services and students. Such consultations would better inform its recommendations.'

Meeting arrangements

The meeting will be held at 2pm in the Sheldonian Theatre. Full arrangements will be published in *Gazette* No 5431, 3 October 2024.

Amendment

'That a university working group shall be convened to recommend revisions to the proposal for amendments to Statute XI previously submitted to Congregation for a meeting on 11 June 2024, so that the proposal can be implemented subject to those revisions. This work should begin in MT2024. The Working Group shall include relevant university officials, a student appointed by the Student Union, and five members of Congregation (one appointed by Conference of Colleges and four appointed by each of the four divisional boards from within their own division) who will bring relevant experience and expertise to the Working Group (for example, experience of student welfare, disciplinary processes, expertise in human rights law and in legislation relating to freedom of expression and academic freedom). Appointments shall be made at the earliest opportunity in MT 2024 following a call for expressions of interest. The Working Group shall consult widely with members of academic staff and professional services, as well as students, to help inform their recommendations. It shall then submit an amended legislative proposal for changes to Statute XI to Education Committee, General Purposes Committee and Council. Noting that this work may usefully be combined with that needed to implement the OfS Regulatory Guidance on Freedom of Speech, but that it is not yet known when that guidance will be available, the remit of the Working Group shall include consideration of the legal context within which Statute XI operates including: (i) all relevant law, including but not limited to the Human Rights Act 1998, the Education (no. 2) Act 1986, the Equality Act 2010, and the Higher Education (Freedom of Speech) Act 2023, as well as associated domestic and international case law and (ii) the protections and rights that this university has extended to its faculty, staff, and/ or students in previous resolutions of Congregation, including but not limited to academic freedom as defined in the Statute XII reference to the UNESCO Recommendation.'

Election of the next Chancellor

The Chancellor is the titular head of the University. In February 2024, Chris Patten, Lord Patten of Barnes, announced that he will retire as Chancellor at the end of the 2023–24 academic year. The incoming Chancellor will be in post for a term of 10 years in accordance with the Statute IX amendments enacted earlier this year.

The election of the Chancellor will be held during Week 3 of Michaelmas term (week commencing 28 October). The election will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Council Regulations 8 of 2002 (*Gazette* No 5421, pp440–1); these regulations are available on the University website at: https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/legislation/council-regulations-8-of-2002.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Members of Congregation are automatically registered to vote in the election of the Chancellor. Other members of Convocation were required to registered to vote online by 18 August. Voter registration is now closed.

VOTING ARRANGEMENTS

The election will be held online only. As outlined from 8 July on the Chancellor's election webpage (www.ox.ac. uk/about/organisation/university-officers/chancellor/ chancellor-election), the Alternative Vote system will be used, whereby voters can rank as many of the candidates as they choose. If the number of candidates in this election is fewer than 10, there will only be one round of voting, and lower-ranking candidates will be eliminated until one candidate achieves 50% of the vote. If there are 10 or more candidates, a second round of voting will be triggered. In this scenario, votes would be counted using the standard Alternative Vote method, but only up to the point where 5 candidates remain. These 5 candidates will go forward to a second round, to take place during Week 6 of Michaelmas term. The new Chancellor will be announced during Week 7. Registered voters will receive emails with a link to cast their vote for both of these rounds if two are required.

THE CHANCELLORSHIP

Statutory provision

Statute IX, sections 2–5, provides as follows.

'2. The Chancellor shall be elected by Convocation and shall hold office for a fixed period decided by Council or until their resignation.

- 3. There shall be a Chancellor's Court of Benefactors to membership of which the Chancellor may from time to time admit major benefactors of the University.
- 4. The Chancellor shall have such other functions and powers as are assigned to them by the statutes and regulations or by the law of the land.
- 5. In the event of the incapacity or absence abroad of the Chancellor, or during a vacancy in the Chancellorship, or on delegation from the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor may exercise any of the functions and powers of the Chancellor, except where the statutes provide otherwise.'

STATEMENT ON THE CHARACTERISTICS OF A CHANCELLOR

For the guidance of candidates and electors

The Chancellor is the ceremonial head of the University of Oxford. While this key role has no executive responsibilities, it is more than symbolic; the Chancellor provides supportive and useful advice and guidance to the University, particularly to the Vice-Chancellor. The Chancellor presides at events such as Encaenia and at the Chancellor's Court of Benefactors and is sometimes expected to take a leading role at other official events. The Chancellor is the Visitor (an external figure of authority on whom the college can call for advice and for arbitration if insoluble dispute arises among its governing body) of five colleges and also chairs the Committee for the Nomination of the Vice-Chancellor. In addition to these formal duties, the Chancellor undertakes advocacy, advisory and fundraising work, acting as an ambassador for the University at a range of local, national and international events. The Chancellor must be readily accessible and available throughout the

The University is seeking a candidate who can demonstrate:

- 1. outstanding achievements in their field and the ability to command respect beyond it;
- a deep appreciation for the University's research and academic mission, its global community, and its ambition to remain a world-class research and teaching university;
- 3. the ability and willingness to enhance the reputation of the University locally, nationally and abroad.

The review will take place on 11 and 12 December and will be chaired by the Deputy Head of Division, Professor Helen McShane.

A copy of the terms of reference for the review is set out below.

- The purpose of the departmental review is to consider and make an assessment of the following aspects of departmental organisation and performance by reference to:
 - planning statements at department and divisional level, and in the context of the University's Mission Statement and Strategic Plan and available data;
 - international standards of excellence and funder expectations/requirements;
 - action taken since the last review of the department;

In particular:

- (a) the organisation of the department, its management structures and the relationship between the faculty/department and the division and the University's services, including such matters as:
 - the structure of the department and the efficacy
 of the structure, including the relationship
 (structural and operational) between units
 within the department, and externally to
 the department and the functioning of the
 department as a single cohesive entity;
 - departmental leadership;
 - departmental governance;
 - strategic planning (including relationship to the divisional five-year plans and the University's Strategic Plan);
 - internal collaboration;
 - external collaboration;
 - staffing level, staff planning and recruitment (academic and professional services staff);
 - staff experience and culture including equality, diversity and inclusion activities and their effectiveness);
 - accommodation and space needs;

- (b) the quality of the research of the department, including its participation in inter-department, inter-divisional and inter-disciplinary activities, its research profile and strategy, and future challenges and opportunities, including:
 - research strategy;
 - research environment and culture;
 - research income:
 - commercialisation and impact of research activities;
- (c) the quality of undergraduate and graduate programmes (postgraduate taught and postgraduate research) and their delivery and related issues, including:
 - · access, admissions and outcomes:
 - teaching, learning and assessment;
 - the relationship between teaching and research;
 - academic and pastoral support and guidance;
 - the provision and use of learning resources (including staff resources);
 - student number planning.
- (d) To consider the current and long-term financial position of, and funding arrangements for, the department, and its financial strategy.
