General Purposes Committee of Council

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **11 November**.

(a) Establishment of the Dame Louise Richardson Professorship in Global Security Fund

Explanatory Note

These changes to regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of endowment gifts to establish the professorship.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, amend regulations for the Dame Louise Richardson Professor in Global Security as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

‘Dame Louise Richardson Professor in Global Security Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude funds to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in these regulations. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Dame Louise Richardson Professor in Global Security Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund for the advancement of education for the benefit of the public by establishing and maintaining the post of the Dame Louise Richardson

Professor in Global Security (“the Professor”).

~~41. The Dame Louise Richardson Professor in Global Security shall undertake research, lecture and give instruction in Global Security.~~

~~52. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:~~

~~(1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;~~

(2) the head of the college to which the professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any decree in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;

(4) a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(5), (6) two persons appointed by Council;

(7) a person appointed by the Social Sciences Board; and

(8)–(10) three persons appointed by the Blavatnik School of Government.

~~63. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.~~

7. The Fund shall be used to pay the salary and expenses of the Professor and associated overheads. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Professor are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the income of the Fund to support the Professor’s research including, but not limited to, by funding postdoctoral researchers and scholarships for DPhil students.

8. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Social Sciences Division.

9. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

10. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund.

11. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of Professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this post.

12. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

13. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

14. Subject to regulation 15, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

15. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved

both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council’

(b) Establishment of the Enzo Cerundolo Memorial Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of gifts from numerous donors.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, insert:

‘Enzo Cerundolo Memorial Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts to be held as an expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Enzo Cerundolo Memorial Fund (“the Fund”).
2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).
3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund to establish a studentship in the Medical Sciences Division, in memory of Enzo Cerundolo. Preference shall be given to students studying for a DPhil in the field of immunological research.
4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Medical Sciences Division.
5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead

of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Scholarship.

7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

8. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

- (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
- (2) be outside the objects of the University.

10. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.

(c) Establishment of the St Cross Community Bursaries Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of gifts from David Scrymgeour.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, insert:

‘St Cross Community Bursaries Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the St Cross Community Bursaries Fund (“the Fund”).
2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).
3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of any further money paid to the Fund to be held as expendable endowment, to establish the St Cross Community Bursaries.
4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of St Cross College.
5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

6. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

7. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

8. Subject to regulation 9, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

9. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.

(d) Establishment of the Simon and June Li Scholarship Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gift from the T. June and Simon K.C. Li Charitable Fund and to specify that the University has decided to award these scholarships to undergraduates.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, insert:

‘Simon and June Li Scholarship Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude the sum of £2,656,758 from the T. June and Simon K.C. Li Charitable Fund to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Simon and June Li Scholarship Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the creation and maintenance of two scholarships to support students who are in financial need and who are ordinarily resident in developing countries in Asia as defined by the UN from time to time.

4. The First Scholarship shall be open to applicants studying in the Humanities Division. The Second Scholarship shall alternate between applicants studying programmes in the Mathematics, Physical and Life Sciences Division and the Social Sciences Division.

5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Board of Management of the Oxford Undergraduate Scholarship Fund of Oxford University Development Trust.

6. The awards shall be open to undergraduates and shall be known as the Simon and June Li Scholarships.

7. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

8. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the

Fund and the Scholarships.

9. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

10. These Regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

11. Subject to regulation 12, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

12. Any amendment to regulations 3 or 4 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.

In Statute XII, any reference to 'a member of the academic staff' is a reference to a person to whom the statute applies (Statute XII, Section 3 (1) and (2)) (<https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/legislation/statute-xii-academic-staff-and-the-visitorial-board#collapse1382986>). College staff are not covered by Statute XII as colleges have their own statutes. The exception is college staff at Kellogg, St Cross and Reuben, which follow the University's statutes. Any staff holding joint appointments will, however, be covered by Statute XII in respect of their University contract of employment and duties.

The terms of reference and membership of this body are set out in Council Regulations 3 of 2017 (<https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/legislation/council-regulations-3-of-2017>).

Members of the Pool will be chosen by lot to serve on a number of Panels under Statute XII (ie Redundancy Panel (Section 14 (6)), Staff Employment Review Panel (Section 35) and University Appeal Panel (Section 52 (2)) and may be expected to also chair a Panel. Before serving on a Panel, each member of the Pool will be required to attend appropriate training, including on equality and diversity, which

takes about half a day in total. Because members of the Pool are chosen by lot, it is hard to predict how many times a member will be asked to serve, but at the very most this is likely to be 3 Panels in a year (and often fewer), which each take around a day - before the hearing there will also be a large bundle of papers to read. Nominations from BME staff, from men and from academic and research staff are particularly encouraged. No particular skills/experience are necessary, but an interest in staffing matters is helpful.

When required, places will be allocated according to academic standing, as defined in Council Regulations 22 of 2002, Part 2: Academic Precedence and Standing (<https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/legislation/council-regulations-22-of-2002>). If the number of nominations received by the closing date is less than sufficient to fill the vacancies, those candidates nominated will be deemed elected unopposed, and the remaining

vacancies will lapse, in which case, in accordance with the regulations, the places must remain vacant until appointments are made jointly by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors.

Period of office

All vacancies are with immediate effect unless otherwise stated. Candidates elected unopposed will take up office as soon as practicable after the result of the election is known (for uncontested elections, this will be as of the close of the nomination period; for contested elections, this will be as of the close of the voting period).
