Congregation 17 June

(1) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XI: University Discipline and consequential amendments to Statute IX: Officers of the University and Statute XII: Academic Staff and the Visitatorial Board

Explanatory Note

On 15 October 2024, Congregation approved a resolution to establish a Working Group to review proposed amendments to Statute XI, following concerns which had been raised when the proposals were originally published in *Gazette* No 5422, 23 May 2024, p465.

The Working Group, chaired by Professor Freya Johnston, and including representatives from the divisions, Conference of Colleges and the Student Union, and relevant Professional Services staff, consulted widely with staff and students over a 9-week period (during the end of Michaelmas term 2024 and the beginning of Hilary term 2025). During its careful consideration of the feedback, the Group was mindful of the need to strike a balance between upholding the University's objectives both of protecting and supporting students and staff and of upholding their rights to free speech and, where relevant, academic freedom. It was also mindful of its remit – to review the proposed amendments to Statute XI previously submitted to Congregation on 11 June 2024, and recommend revisions to that proposal, not to seek to extend or restrict existing provisions within the current statute. The Group also took into account the requirements of the University's regulators and the desire to follow best practice guidance, including the requirements of the new Office for Students' Condition of Registration (E6) on harassment and sexual misconduct and the views of the University working group tasked with considering compliance with that condition.

The Education Committee, the General Purposes Committee and Council have now considered the Working Group's proposals, alongside its careful consideration of the feedback received during the consultation process and detailed rationale for the proposed changes.

The proposed changes are required to:

 allow the University to investigate more cases of serious misconduct without complaints having to be made to the police first. Currently, if a student reports a serious incident, the University may decline to use its disciplinary procedures unless the matter has been reported to the police and they have investigated. This often leads to frustration from students and lengthy processes;

- make the disciplinary process more accessible, clearer, and more effective by consolidating four sets of Regulations and the existing Statute into a shorter and more accessible Statute XI and single comprehensive procedure (with different versions for academic and non-academic matters);
- meet the Office for Students' (OfS) Condition of Registration relating to "harassment and sexual misconduct" by providing a comprehensive and accessible process for considering such allegations against student members – this requirement comes into force from 1 August 2025;
- reduce scope for complaints by introducing greater compliance with the Office for the Independent Adjudicator's (OIA) "Good Practice Framework for Non-Academic Disciplinary Procedures", which is based on the core principles of "accessibility; clarity; proportionality; timeliness; fairness; independence; confidentiality; improving the student experience"; and of procedures being written in straightforward language and following the principles of natural justice;
- enable a more streamlined and agile University response to future developments in sector best practice guidance and regulatory requirements; and
- align the University's procedures more closely with those adopted by many of the colleges.

If the legislative proposal is approved by Congregation, a number of regulations will be discontinued, as recommended by Council.

(2) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute VI: Council (membership) and consequential amendments relating to terms of office for casual vacancies

Explanatory Note

Currently, legislation for Council, its committees and other committees/bodies provides that, when a vacancy occurs other than at the end of a term of office (ie if a member steps down early) – a 'casual vacancy' – the newly appointed or elected member takes up their position immediately and holds office for the unexpired residue only of the period of office of the person whom they have replaced. In some cases, this might be as short as one academic term (or less). This creates a number of difficulties for committees, incoming committee members, and for those administering the appointment and election processes with no obvious advantages. It is therefore proposed that the legislation be amended to allow for casual vacancies to be filled for a full term of office instead. In order to tie in start and end dates with the beginning and end of term, it is proposed that, as a default, new members take up office on the first day of the term following immediately upon their appointment or election. Currently, where there are limits on how long members may serve, eg 2 consecutive full terms of office, an exception is generally made for casual terms of office – ie they do not count towards the limit. For those appointed or elected under the current legislation, that exception will continue to apply. However, if the proposed changes to the legislation are approved, going forward, future limits will be based on full terms of office only. The opportunity is also taken to replace 'chairman' with the term 'chair' and to change instances of 'his or her' to 'their'.

The opportunity is also being taken to propose the correction of two internal cross references that should have been updated to reflect previous changes to Statute VI (in section 8 (6)).

(3) Voting on Changes to Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002: regulations for Congregation for the conduct of business in Congregation

Explanatory Note

Currently, if an amended resolution is unopposed by Council or members of Congregation, the Congregation regulations still require a meeting of Congregation to take place, although the meeting affords no opportunity for Congregation to further amend the resolution. It is therefore proposed that the regulations are altered to remove this requirement.

(1) Voting on a Resolution authorising space in the Oxford Molecular Pathology Institute

Explanatory Note

As required by section 4 of Statute XVI, approval of this resolution is requested because of the size of the proposed space allocation.

The Oxford Molecular Pathology Institute houses the University Shared Data Centre (USDC), which was constructed in 2011 to provide specialist server space for IT Services. This resolution seeks to extend the existing allocation for a non-time-limited period due to the ongoing need for this essential facility.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 634 sqm net usable area within the Oxford Molecular Pathology Institute (building 510) be allocated to IT Services, UAS, for a non-time limited period, commencing 20 October 2025.

(2) Voting on a Resolution authorising space in the Robert Hooke Building

Explanatory Note

As required by section 4 of Statute XVI, approval of this resolution is requested because of the size of the proposed space allocation.

The Department of Computer Science's occupation of the Robert Hooke Building (building 160) was most recently allocated in June 2020 for a 5-year period, which represented an extension of an expired 2015 allocation of the same space. Since the previous allocation, the department has marginally increased its occupied area from 1,048 sqm net usable area to a total of 1,097 sqm net

usable area. The department has long term ambitions to consolidate into a purpose-built facility; however, this is not scheduled to occur soon. As such, a non-time-limited space allocation renewal is requested until such time that an alternative accommodation can be provided.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 1,097 sqm net usable area within Robert Hooke Building (building 160) be allocated to the Department of Computer Science for a non-time limited period, commencing 17 June 2025.

(3) Voting on a Resolution authorising space in the Rex Richards Building

Explanatory Note

As required by section 4 of Statute XVI, approval of this resolution is requested because of the size of the proposed space allocation.

The Department of Materials currently occupies a total of 1,696 sqm NUA within the Rex Richards Building (building 271). The majority of space is allocated on a non-time-limited basis, with the remaining portion allocated for a fixed 5-year period expiring on 8 March 2025, following the relocation of the MPLS Doctoral Training Programme to 1–4 Keble Road in March 2020. The Rex Richards Building houses the Centre for Energy Storage Materials Research, which is one of the world's

leading battery technology research labs. This facility is considered central to Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences research for the foreseeable future and as such it is requested that the expired allocation be approved on a non-time limited basis in line with the department's existing allocation within the building.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 860 sqm net usable area within Rex Richards Building (building 271) be allocated to the Department of Materials for a non-time-limited period, retrospectively commencing from 8 March 2025.
