Changes to Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on

21 February.

(a) Changes to the Welch Scholarships

Explanatory Note

These changes, made on the recommendation of the Board of Management for the Welch Scholarships, amend the composition of that board. The opportunity is also taken to update the cross reference to statutes.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, amend the Welch Scholarships as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'Welch Scholarships

The board of management for the administration of the Welch Scholarships under the provisions of Tit. XVI, Sect. LIXPart 52 of the Schedule to the Statutes shall consist of:

- (1) the Warden of Wadham College or the Warden's representative;
- (2)-(4) three persons appointed by the Board of the Medical Sciences Division;
- (5), (6) two persons appointed by the Board of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division.
- (2), (3) two persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Biological Sciences;
- (4) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Clinical Medicine;
- (5) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Physiological Sciences;
- (6) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Psychological Studies.
- The members under (2)-(6) above shall hold office for three years and shall be re-eligible.'

(b) Establishment of the Regius Professorship of Mathematics

Explanatory Note

These changes, made on the recommendation of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board, establish a statutory post to underpin the Regius Professorship of Mathematics.

Text of Regulations

1 In the Schedule of Statutory Professorships annexed to Council Regulations 3 of 2004, insert:

- 'Regius Professor of Mathematics'
- **2** In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, insert.
- 'Regius Professor of Mathematics
- 1. The Regius Professor of Mathematics shall undertake research in and shall lecture and give instruction in mathematics and generally promote its study in the University.
- 2. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.'

(c) Establishment of the Hillary Rodham Clinton Professor of Women's History Fund

Explanatory Note

These changes, made on the recommendation of the Humanities Divisional Board, establish the new Hillary Rodham Clinton Professor of Women's History Fund to endow a new professorship of Women's History.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In the Schedule of Statutory Professorships annexed to Council Regulations 3 of 2004, insert:
- 'Hillary Rodham Clinton Professor of Women's History'
- **2** In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, insert:

- 'Hillary Rodham Clinton Professor of Women's History Fund
- 1. The University receives with gratitude the sum raised by public subscription to mark the centenary, in 2020, of women receiving degrees at Oxford to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Hillary Rodham Clinton Chair of Women's History Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, for the advancement of education for the benefit of the public, in particular by establishing and maintaining a Professorship of Women's History ("the Professorship").
- 4. The Professorship shall be known as the Hillary Rodham Clinton Chair in Women's History, and its holder shall be known as the Hillary Rodham Clinton Professor of Women's History ("the Professor").
- 5. The Professor shall undertake research, lecture and teach in Women's History
- 6. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or if the head of the college specified in paragraph (2) below is the Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time; or if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in paragraph (2) above:

- (4)-(5) two persons appointed by Council:
- (6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee;
- (7)-(9) three persons appointed by the Humanities Board, at least one of whom shall be an external person.
- 7. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations, which are applicable to the Chair.
- 8. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Humanities Divisional Board
- 9. The Fund shall be used towards the salary, expenses and associated overheads of the Professorship. If these costs are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the Fund towards (a) any and all costs associated with the Professor's work, including without limitation salaries and costs of posts for research staff, support for graduate students supervised by the Professor, equipment, consumables, and other expenses; and (b) related activities in support of the field of Women's History.
- 10. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of these regulations, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 11. The University shall have power to pay out of the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund and the Professorship.
- 12. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

- 13. Regulations 1-5 and 8-15 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 14. Subject to regulation 15, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales: or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 15. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(d) Change of name for the Professorship of Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery

Explanatory Note

These changes, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Board, rename the Professorship of Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery as the Professorship of Surgical Sciences.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In the Schedule of Statutory Professorships annexed to Council Regulations 3 of 2004, amend as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):
- 'Professor of Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery Surgical Sciences'
- **2** In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend the Professor of Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):
- 'Professor of Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery <u>Surgical Sciences</u>
- 1. The Professor of Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery Professor of Surgical Sciences shall undertake research, lecture and give instruction in Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery Surgical Sciences.

- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or if the head of the college specified in paragraph (2) below is the Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time; or if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in paragraph (2) above;
 - (4)-(5) two persons appointed by Council;
 - (6)-(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;
 - (10) a person holding a clinical appointment appointed by the relevant NHS body with which the post-holder will hold an honorary contract.
- 3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations, which are applicable to the Chair.'
