Ashmolean Museum

REQUEST FROM THE HIGH COMMISSION OF INDIA FOR THE RETURN OF TWO INDIAN BRONZES HELD BY THE ASHMOLEAN MUSEUM

In accordance with the procedure for dealing with repatriation claims set out in the University's Procedures for Claims for the Return of Cultural Objects, the Visitors of the Ashmolean Museum have considered the request for the return of two Indian Bronzes from the High Commission of India: a 16th-century bronze of Saint Tirumankai Alvar (EA1967.42) and an 11th-century bronze Siva with Attendants (LI181.16). Having considered the evidence relating to both claims the Visitors are recommending that Council agree to the return of EA1967.42 to the temple of Shri Soundarraja Perumal Kovil in Kumbakonam, Tamil Nadu, India, on moral grounds; and that Council do not agree to the return of LI181.16 as there is no evidence to support

the work's previous ownership or its possible theft. The Procedures for Claims for the Return of Cultural Objects (www.glam.ox.ac.uk/procedures-for-return-of-cultural-objects-claims), requires that, when the governing body of the relevant museum has submitted a claim to Council, notice of the recommendation and availability of the dossier of the case for consultation should be advertised in the *Gazette*, giving parties with an interest an opportunity to comment. Any comments received are to be considered by Council in reaching a final decision on the recommendation submitted by the Board of Visitors of the Museum. TRIBE CRANIUM HELD IN THE COLLECTIONS OF THE
OXFORD UNIVERSITY MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

In accordance with the procedure for dealing with repatriation claims set out in the University's Human Remains Policy and Procedures for the return of Human Remains, the Visitors of the Oxford University Museum of Natural History (OUMNH) has considered a claim from the Hopi Tribe Cultural Preservation Office for the repatriation of a human cranium (accessioned with the reference number OUMNH-ZC-21986) collected in 1900 by the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago and exchanged with the OUMNH in 1929. The Visitors are recommending that the Council agree to the return of these remains.

The procedure for claims to return human remains as laid out in the Policy on Human Remains held by the University of Oxford's Museums (www.glam.ox.ac.uk/human-remains-policy) requires that, when the governing body of the relevant museum has submitted a claim, notice of the recommendation and availability of the dossier of the case for consultation should be advertised in the <code>Gazette</code>, giving parties with an interest an opportunity to comment. Any comments received are to be considered by Council in reaching a final decision on the recommendation submitted by the Board of Visitors of the Museum.

Van Houten Fund

The van Houten Bequest is a fund left by the late Georges van Houten in the 1960s to be used for the benefit of the University. Bids are now being invited for grants to support projects that can be shown to offer a broad strategic benefit to the University, but that do not form part of the normal day-to-day operations of a department and would not easily be funded from other regular sources.

Grants to applicants from within the University are usually in the region of £2,000–£12,000, either given as a one-off award, or spread over two or three years. Grants are also available to organisations external to the University; in such cases, the amount awarded are usually lower and there is a cap on the total amount of funding made available to external organisations in any given bidding round. The cap is currently £25,000. Certain such projects, which would more appropriately be supported from the University's Community Grants Scheme, (https://www.ox.ac.uk/local-community/small-community-grants), will be advised to apply to that fund.

The most recent invitation to bid, in February 2023, attracted 15 applications. Grants awarded recently have included support for:

- Oxford Net Zero Youth Training Programme: a
 12-week course delivered by global climate experts
 to empower young people with the knowledge and
 skills required to navigate the complex and technical
 language of topics discussed at the United Nations
 climate conferences and make targeted interventions
 at COP28;
- working in partnership with students: a project focused on gaining an in-depth understanding of disabled students' experiences with the University's new approach to creating, communicating and implementing Student Support Plans (SSPs);
- Oxford Mutual Aid: a project focused on recruiting and supporting student volunteers to participate in the work of supporting local people affected by food poverty, including expansion of the Kitchen Collective programme, which distributes meals to local residents.

The guidelines by which bids are assessed are as follows:

 Bids for grants will be assessed by focusing on outcomes according to the breadth of the benefit to the University offered by the project in question, the strategic importance of the project to the University and the availability of funds. For internal applications, priority will be given to initiatives that are closely aligned to the University's strategic plan. Only in exceptional circumstances will a grant

- be awarded in respect of a project which benefits a single department.
- Grants will not ordinarily be awarded for purposes for which other trust fund (or similar) support exists within the University, for example, the funding of academic scholarships, regardless of whether or not the alternative fund(s) in question are in a position to fund the expenditure proposed.
- Grants will not ordinarily be awarded in respect of costs for which a department might reasonably be expected to hold a budget, or to replace service funding.
- 4. Grants will not ordinarily be agreed in respect of recurrent activities except to provide:
 - (a) seed funding to support an activity in its first one to three years; or
 - (b) bridging support for one year only where a source of funding is lost and the department/ faculty in question is confident that an alternative can be found for the following year.
- 5. Grants will not ordinarily cover the full cost of a project. Departments will be expected to make some contribution, or to use the grant secured by the Van Houten Fund to assist in securing other funding (including external funding).
- 6. The extent to which funds may be awarded to external organisations each financial year may be subject to an upper limit, to be set by the General Purposes Committee and reviewed on an annual basis.

Grants are payable on a reimbursement basis in response to claims demonstrating the actual costs incurred. It is expected that costs will initially be incurred by your department/college/organisation. Claims must be for the activities as described in the initial application; claims for costs incurred that do not fit with the description detailed in the application will not be approved. It is important that you establish how you will incur the costs initially before you submit your bid.

The bids will be considered by the Registrar as a gathered field. Bids should be made on the application form which is available from the van Houten Fund web page: https://governance.admin.ox.ac.uk/van-houten-fund. Applications should be sent, as a Word document via email, to the Trusts Officer, Gemma Proctor (trusts@admin.ox.ac.uk), by 5 April.

General information about the Pool

The terms of reference and membership of this body are set out in Council Regulations 3 of 2017.

The Pool is comprised of 46 persons, elected by Congregation, in one of seven constituencies: each of the four academic divisions; Gardens, Libraries and

Museums; University Administration and Services; and non-divisional (not necessarily representing any division and not in any case being nominated in a divisional capacity). By convention, it is expected that candidates for election to represent a constituency will also be a member of that constituency.

All members of Congregation are eligible to nominate a candidate or to vote in the above elections, but prospective candidates who want to stand for election must be a member of Congregation to whom Statute XII applies (that is: professors, readers, associate professors or lecturers; any employee of the University who is a member of the Universities Superannuation Scheme or who would be a member if he or she had not been exempted under the provisions of Statute XIV; and the Vice-Chancellor to the extent and in the manner set out in Part G of Statute XII). College staff are not covered by Statute XII as colleges have their own statutes. The exception is college staff at Kellogg, St Cross and Reuben, which follow the University's statutes. Any staff holding joint appointments will, however, be covered by Statute XII in respect of their University contract of employment and duties.

The full term of office is four years (or less, when a by-election is held to fill the residue of the term of office for an elected member who is standing down early).

Further information about the Pool

Members of the Pool will be chosen by lot to serve on a number of Panels under Statute XII (ie Redundancy Panel (Section 14 (6)), Staff Employment Review Panel (Section 35) and University Appeal Panel (Section 52 (2)) and may be expected to also chair a Panel. Before serving on a Panel, each member of the Pool will be required to attend appropriate training, including on equality and diversity, which takes about half a day in total. Because members of the Pool are chosen by lot, it is hard to predict how many times a member will be asked to serve, but at the very most this is likely to be three Panels in a year (and often less), which each take around a day – before the hearing there will also be a large bundle of papers to read. Nominations from BME staff, from men and from academic and research staff are particularly encouraged. No particular skills/experience are necessary, but an interest in staffing matters is helpful.
