<b>Explanatory Notes</b>	
For English Paper 6 (special options), EML students should have the same options available as ELL students. Currently there is an ambiguity in the regulations which could be read to imply that the 1550-1660 period paper is not available to EML students taking Course II as a P6 option, as it specifies "an extended essay", but this exclusion was never intended.
