  - '4. No candidate shall be admitted for the Part II examination in this school unless
    - (a) he or she has passed the Part I examination for Experimental Psychology; and
    - (b) he or she has satisfied the Moderators for the Preliminary Examination for Psychology and Philosophy in Psychology, Philosophy, and Linguistics in the subject *Introduction to Probability Theory and Statistics* or has passed the Qualifying Examination in Statistics for this School.'
- 2. Ibid., p. 211, Il. 7-41, amend as follows:
  - '1. Research Project and Library Dissertation

Whether undertaking the The research project, or the research project and the library dissertation, such work will normally be carried out in the Trinity Term and the following Michaelmas Term in the year preceding the Part II examinations.

Candidates will be required to <u>undertake such do project</u>-work under the supervision of one of the following:

- (i) any member of the Faculty of Psychological Studies.
- (ii) any other person approved by the Divisional Board provided that such approval shall be applied for not later than Friday of fourth week of Michaelmas Full Term in the year preceding the Part II examinations.

The subject of the library dissertation and the research project should not overlap to the extent that they should not draw on substantially the same literature. Candidates are warned that they should avoid repetition in examination papers of material used in the research project or library dissertation and that substantial repetition may be penalised.

All proposed research projects or library dissertations must be approved in advance by the Head of the Department of Experimental Psychology or deputy. The procedures for obtaining this approval will be notified to students by the Head of Department of Experimental Psychology or deputy.

Two <u>bound</u> copies <u>and one electronic copy</u> of completed <u>research</u> projects and library dissertations must be submitted to the Chair of Examiners, Honour School of Experimental Psychology, Examination Schools, Oxford, not later than noon on <u>Friday Monday</u> of the <u>eighth\_ninth</u> week and <u>Monday of the tenth\_eleventh</u> week of Hilary Term respectively, in the year of the examination. A certificate signed by the candidate indicating that the work submitted is the candidate's own work, and a statement of the number of words in the <u>research\_project</u> or <u>library\_dissertation</u>, must be submitted separately in respect of each research project and library dissertation in a sealed envelope addressed to the Chair of Examiners. Research projects and library dissertations previously submitted for the Honour School of Experimental Psychology may be resubmitted. No <u>research\_project</u> or <u>library\_dissertation</u> will be accepted if it has already been submitted wholly or substantially, for another Honour School or degree of this University, or for a degree of any other institution.

2. Candidates will be required to undertake practical work, as specified by the Head of Department of Experimental Psychology or deputy, and this will constitute a part of the examination. In exceptional circumstances the Proctors may exempt a candidate from the specified requirements on the recommendation of the Head of Department or deputy.'

# **Explanatory Notes**

- (a) References to the pre-requisites for entering the Part II Examination are being updated for accuracy, with regard to the relevant Prelim examination. Other changes make it clear that the Head of the Department of Experimental Psychology may nominate a deputy to carry out duties specified in these regulations.
- (b) To require the submission of an electronic copy of Research Projects and Library Dissertations, in anticipation of enabling the Department to use software applications to screen any individual's submitted work for matches either to published sources or to

other submitted work.

(c) To enable the examiners to apply a progressive tariff of academic penalties for late submission, submission deadlines are being moved to a day in the week other than a Friday.

**Note** that changes (b) and (c) affect what is required of candidates taking Psychology within the Honour School of Psychology, Philosophy, and Linguistics; however, a formal change to the regulations for the joint honours programme is not required.

In response to feedback from students and College Tutors, the Educational Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board has approved a recommendation from the Biomedical Sciences Steering Committee that students following the Neuroscience pathway should be able to take a Paper 3 (Critical reading, data analysis and experimental design) instead of a second Psychology Advanced Option, if they so wish.

approval on behalf of the Educational Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board, according to the procedure set out in the handbook for medical students in Years 1-3.'

# **Explanatory Notes**

Changes to the General Regulations for the First Public Examination have resulted in there being two options available to students who have failed their second attempt at the First BM Part I Examination. The coexistence of two different routes of appeal is confusing and could give rise to complaints from students; this requires redress as soon as possible. The Medical Sciences Board has agreed that the University's Education Committee should deal with applications for a third attempt at the First BM Part I, in common with other First Public Examinations.

For each subject, the Director of Pre-Clinical Studies or his or her deputy will-may request practical notebooks from any candidate in order to subsequently make available to the examiners evidence (in the form of a list of names, signed by the Director or his or her deputy) showing the extent to which each candidate has a satisfactory attendance record at practical classes in that subject and the extent to which each candidate has a satisfactory record of practical work in that subject. The examiners may also request practical notebooks from any candidate; such candidates will be named in a list posted in the foyer of the Medical Sciences Teaching Centre one week before the day of the first examination paper. Each notebook submitted shall be accompanied by a statement signed by the candidate indicating that the notebook is the candidate's own work.'

# **Explanatory Notes**

The regulations for Part C of subjects 1,2,3,5,6, and 7 of the First BM Examination state that the Director of Pre-Clinical Studies will make available to the Examiners evidence showing the extent to which each candidate has a satisfactory record of practical work in those subjects. In order to do this, the Director of Pre-Clinical Studies may, in some cases, need to request that candidates submit their practical notebooks, prior to any such request being made by the Examiners.

  - 4. Candidates shall follow a course of study in Musculoskeletal Sciences on a part-time basis for at least six terms, and including vacations, as determined by the course timetable. The course commences every two years in January and runs until December of the following year.'

# '(i) Year 1 (January to December)

- (a) Each candidate shall submit a literature review of no more than 4,000 words on a topic selected by the candidate and approved by the Organising Committee. The review must be submitted during Week 2 of Michaelmas term in Week 4 of Trinity Term on a date to be specified in the course handbook.
- (b) Each candidate must pass an examination <u>during the Long Vacation (normally in September)</u> in <u>Michaelmas Term</u>. The examination will comprise two elements: the first of these will consist of a one-hour computer-based assessment comprising multiple-choice questions; the second of these will constitute a two-hour written paper. The dates of the examination will be specified in the course handbook.

# (ii) Year 2 (January to December)

- (a) Each candidate must submit, for assessment of their progress, an outline research proposal. The outline must be submitted in Hilary-Michaelmas Term on a date to be specified in the course handbook.
- (b) Each candidate will be assessed on their presentation skills by means of a public oral presentation on his or her research topic. The presentation must take place in <a href="mailto:Trinity-Hilary">Trinity-Hilary</a>. Term on a date to be specified in the course handbook.
- (c) Each candidate must submit a written research proposal of no more than 10,000 words on a topic selected by the candidate and approved by the Organising Committee. The proposal must be submitted in Michaelmas-Trinity Term on a date to be specified in the course handbook.
- (d) Each candidate must pass an examination <u>during the Long Vacation (normally in September)</u>in Michaelmas Term. The examination will comprise two elements: the first of these will consist of a one-hour computer-based assessment comprising multiple-choice questions; the second of these will constitute a two-hour written paper. The dates of the examination will be specified in the course handbook.'
- 3. Ibid., citation reference 1.16, amend the clause as follows:
  - '8. Candidates will be allowed one opportunity to retake or resubmit each of the required elements, normally within <u>six-two\_months</u> of the original failure, should they fail to reach the necessary standard. Candidates failing to pass any element at the second attempt will normally be judged to have failed to reach the necessary standard for the award and will not be permitted to continue.'

  - '11. The examiners may award a postgraduate diploma Postgraduate Diploma to candidates who have satisfied the requirements for the award of the Postgraduate

<del>Diploma (comprising</del> all assessments with the exception of the written research proposal), and who do not wish to continue their studies, or who fail to meet the required standard for the written research proposal.'

# **Explanatory Notes**

- 1. Since its inception, the course has appointed two academic supervisors for each candidate; this amendment improves the accuracy of the regulations. The other amendments constitute a minor adjustment for clarity, and removal of a reference to the course taking place over a calendar rather than an academic year.
- 2. These amendments adjust deadlines so that they correspond with an academic year rather than a calendar year.
- 3. It is preferable for candidates who need to re-take assessments to do so at the earliest opportunity, instead of waiting six months to do so.
- 4. Since the introduction of the programme, the Postgraduate Diploma has only been intended for use as an exit award from the Master's, rather than as a stand-alone award. The MSc regulations are being clarified to reflect this, and the separate postgraduate diploma regulations are being removed (see regulation change 1415-10-TPT) because they duplicate the existing MSc regulations.

- '5. Candidates must be registered with the General Medical Council, hold an appropriate contract with the National Health Service, and have had appropriate experience in Diagnostic Radiology and/or Neurosurgery or Neurology.'
- 2. Ibid., delete clauses 6, and substitute:
  - '6. Each candidate will be required to submit a logbook of 10,000-15,000 words (excluding references, legends and acknowledgements) for examination describing a minimum of 10 cases in which the student has participated in the patient's diagnosis and/or treatment.'
- 3. Ibid., amend clause 7 as follows:
  - '7. Each candidate will be required to submit a dissertation of no more than 15,000 words (excluding legends and citations) on a subject selected in consultation with the

candidate's supervisor and approved by the Organising Committee. The dissertation may vary from an account of original research work to a survey of the literature. Dissertations which reproduce substantially work submitted in the other written assignments will not be admissible.'

- 4. Ibid., delete clause 8 and substitute:
  - '8. Three printed copies of each of the required written submissions (dissertation and log book) must be delivered to the Department, c/o Chair of the Examiners. These must be submitted by a date to be specified by the Organising Committee and which will be published in the student handbook (not later than the start of Michaelmas Term of the academic year in which the examination is taken) as a date that would usually fall after the two week period following the end of the written examinations in Trinity term of the same academic year. Each written submission must be accompanied by a Declaration of Authorship signed by the candidate confirming that it is his or her own work.'
- 5. Ibid., amend clause 9 as follows:
  - '9. An oral examination will be held and this may include questions on the candidate's dissertation, logbook, or written examination papers.'
- 6. Ibid., add clause 11 as follows:
  - '11. The examiners shall retain two copies of the dissertation of each candidate who passes the examination, for deposit in the departmental library.'

As from year to year candidates may be assigned a different number of cases to describe in their log books (depending on the number of students in a cohort) it was decided that a 'from-to' word limit prescribed for a log book would be more appropriate to avoid students with a bigger number of cases being penalised for going over the originally prescribed limit of 10,000 words. It was also necessary to clarify which parts of log book are included in the prescribed word limit (change 2).
- 3. To clarify which parts of dissertation are included in the prescribed word limit (change 3).
- 4. To update place of submission of the dissertation and log book (in line with current departmental procedures) and to clarify arrangements for setting the deadline for submission of these assignments (change 4).
- 5. To move a section of examination regulations to a sequentially more appropriate place (change 6).

- '(ii) each candidate will be required to submit to the examiners either two copies of a typewritten or printed essay of not more than 3,000 words on a topic approved by the Organising Committee in each of the five four modules chosen for study, as set out in the Schedule, or in the case of the modules specified by the Organising Committee one practical notebook in each module chosen for study; candidates must submit their titles for approval by deadlines determined by the Organising Committee and posted in the Gazette no later than the end of the preceding term;'
- 2. Ibid., at the end of section 4 add clause (v) as follows:
- '(v) each candidate will be required to participate in the compulsory Journal Club and give a presentation.'

3. Ibid., amend section (c) (citation reference 1.33) in the SCHEDULE as follows:

This will consist of five taught courses consisting of lectures, seminars, practicals, and demonstrations, chosen from a list of courses in neuroscience to be approved annually by the Organising Committee. These will be grouped under three headings: molecular, cellular, and systems, and candidates will be required to choose at least one course under each of the three headings. Details of the courses available in each academic year will be published in the Gazette in the preceding Trinity Term Course Handbook and on the course website not later than the start of Michaelmas Term of the academic year in which the examination is taken.'

The suggestion to change Journal Club from an optional to compulsory module came from the students in the course annual feedback meeting. Through the years it became increasingly popular with students because:

- it represents all the other modules so it exposes students to the breadth of Neuroscience;
- it is an excellent educational activity that students who enter academia will use often;
- it involves presentation skills so a different form of learning than essay writing or practical portfolio.

Taking the above into consideration the Course Committee decided that it was appropriate to approve this change.

Each candidate shall be required to submit two hard copies and one electronic copy of a 2,000 word review of a journal article assigned by the Organising Committee to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford. The deadline for submission shall be notified to students at the start of the course.'.

- Delete Clause 4, A, II and substitute:
- II. Statistical Theory and Methods
- (a) Each candidate shall be required to submit two hard copies and one electronic copy each of the four Statistical Workshop assessments based on data analyses carried out during statistical workshops to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford. The deadline for each submission shall be notified to students at the start of the course.
- (b) Each candidate shall also be required to sit a two-hour written examination. The examination will be marked on a pass/fail basis and candidates failing to reach the required standard will have one further opportunity to enter for the examination before the end of the academic year.'.

# 'III. MatLab Programming for Experimental Psychology

Each candidate shall be required to submit one electronic copy of\_a piece of MatLab code that they have produced, as well as two hard copies and one electronic copy of\_a report of no more than 3,000 words that explains the code to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford. The deadline for submission shall be notified to students at the start of the course. Each candidate shall make a brief oral presentation of their code to a group of two assessors, after which, the candidate shall be assessed *viva voce* on the code. The form of the presentation to the assessors shall be specified in the course information at the beginning of the academic year of the examination. Candidates who do not give a presentation and do not pass the *viva voce* assessment to a satisfactory standard will be deemed to have failed the module.'.

### 'IV. Computer Modelling of Brain Function

Each candidate shall be required to submit two hard copies and one electronic copy a portfolio of reports based on practical work completed during the module and an essay of no more than 3,000 words Committee to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford. Essay topics must be approved by the Organising Committee. The deadline for submission shall be notified to students at the start of the course. Candidates who fail to submit a portfolio will be deemed to have failed the module.'

Each candidate shall be required to submit two hard copies and one electronic copy of a 3,000 word review of relevant literature and methods relating to their chosen research project to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford. The deadline for submission shall be notified to students at the start of the course. Each candidate shall make an oral presentation on the methodological aspects of their own research project. Candidates who fail to give a presentation will be deemed to have failed the module.

# 'B. Optional Modules

Candidates shall be assessed in each of three optional modules, selected from the following list:

- 1. Philosophical Foundations of Psychology
- II. Brain and Cognition
- III. Emotion, Personality and Social Behaviour
- IV. Language and Development

For each optional module undertaken, candidates shall be required to submit two hard copies and one electronic copy of\_an essay of no more than 3,000 words to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford. Essay topics must be approved by the Organising Committee. The deadlines for submission shall be notified to students at the start of the course.'.

### C. Research Project

Candidates shall be required to submit not later than noon on the first Monday in September, three <u>bound</u> copies and one electronic copy of a typewritten or printed dissertation of not more than 10,000 words in length (excluding bibliography and any

appendices) on his or her research project to the Chair of Examiners, MSc in Psychological Research, c/o Examination Schools, Oxford.

Candidates shall also be required to deliver a poster presentation based on their research project. However, this shall not contribute to the overall result for this module. The date on which candidates are required to deliver their presentations will be in the Long Vacation.'.

- '5. Candidates must achieve a pass in each of the modules in order to pass the examination overall. # **Explanatory Notes**

To make some updates for accuracy and to ensure that the examination regulations and conventions are aligned.

To require an electronic copy of each submission, in anticipation of enabling the Department to use software applications to screen any individual's submitted work for matches either to published sources or to other submitted work.

To update the regulations to reflect changes to the programme which were approved by the Medical Sciences Board in Trinity Term 2015, namely:

• To eliminate the one-term Mini-Project, which has received negative feedback from students for not being of long enough duration and not adding sufficient value, and instead allow students to engage with their major Research Project and to integrate with their group/lab earlier in the course.

The introduction of a presentation and viva voce assessment for the MatLab module will assist the assessors in their understanding of the students' application of the MatLab code.

- '3. Each candidate shall follow a course of study in Radiation Biology for at least three terms and for a substantial part of the three subsequent vacations, as determined by the course timetable. The Course Director will provide a list showing the extent to which each candidate has satisfied these requirements.'
- 2. Ibid., delete clauses 4(i)-4(iii), and substitute:
  - '(i) Each candidate must pass a qualifying examination at the end of Michaelmas

Term. The examination shall be on modules 1-6 in the Schedule. Candidates who fail the qualifying examination once shall be permitted to re-take it on one further occasion only in Week 0 of Hilary Term.

- (ii) Each candidate will be required to submit to the examiners two copies of a typewritten or printed assignment of 3,000 words by noon, Friday of Week 6 of Hilary Term. A choice of assignment titles will be provided to students by Week 8 of Michaelmas Term. Candidates must pass this assignment in order to proceed with the course. Those who fail the assignment shall be permitted to re-take it on one further occasion only. The assignment should be re-submitted by noon, Friday of Week 8 of Trinity Term. The assignment will account for 15 per cent of the final marks.
- (iii) Each candidate must pass a three-hour written examination at the end of Hilary Term (normally in Week 9). The examination shall be on the modules set out in the Schedule. In order to proceed with the course, candidates who fail the examination shall be permitted to re-take it on one further occasion only in Week 0 of Trinity Term. The examination will account for 25 per cent of the final marks.'
- 3. Ibid., delete clause *c.* (citation reference 1.11), and substitute:
  - 'c. Each candidate will be examined viva voce by the examiners.

The dissertation, presentation and viva voce will be given a single grade and account for 60 per cent of the final marks. Candidates must pass this component and those who fail this component once shall be permitted to re-take it on one further occasion only at the times these elements are examined during the following academic year.'

4. Ibid., delete clause 5 and renumber clauses 6, 7, and 8 accordingly.

### **Explanatory Notes**

- 1. To update the regulations for accuracy in line with departmental procedures.
- 2. It has been decided that moving the submission deadline of the extended essay from week 8 to 6 of Hilary Term will benefit both students and examiners. It minimises overlap with revision and revision tutorials towards the written examination (timing outlined in clause 4(iii)) and facilitates marking of exam questions, to enable candidates that have failed to be informed in good time and maximise revision time prior to second attempt.
  - Timings of re-sits were clarified in response to request issued by the Education Policy Support Section.
- 3. A new sub-paragraph was created to improve clarity of regulations relating to the component incorporating dissertation, presentation and viva voce examination and to introduce clarification relating to timing of re-sits for this component.
- 4. Due to the above clarifications of timings for re-sits, clause 5 became redundant.
