1.10 (a) Each candidate shall be required to submit two hard copies and one electronic copy of each of the four Statistical Workshop assessments based on data analyses carried out during statistical workshops. Explanatory Notes

The 2014/15 MSc Pharmacology Examiners' Report highlighted some areas for improvement with regards the format and timing of the qualifying examination in Michaelmas Term of the final (only) year of examination. Due to the format of the examination, failing candidates were unable to resit in good time and were often unaware of their results until they had undertaken a large proportion of the remaining academic schedule. The MSc course committee agreed that this was not beneficial to either the students or the course itself and agreed to change the format of the exam from written to computer-based. The content of the examination will remain the same.

The course committee also agreed to bring itself in line with comparable MScs and have only one qualifying examination as it felt having two qualifying examinations created an unnecessary hurdle for students. Candidates must still pass all elements of assessment.

Each candidate will be expected to have studied 8 themes in order to address the synoptic questions of Paper 2, and to have prepared sufficient of those themes in depth to be able to address the requirements of Paper 1 (see paras 2, 3, and 5 below).

Explanatory Notes

The options of the school are currently published in the examination regulations themselves, and a change to the regulations is required every time there is a decision to change the name of any one of the options. This is administratively burdensome and can delay the process of making changes which are academically desirable.

The Faculty of Physiological Sciences Course and Examination Policy Committee wishes to have the ability to change the options of the school if necessary (provided that the list of options is published in good time to candidates and provided that the committee has considered the impact that the change might have on students) without the need to make a change to the examination regulations.

Explanatory Notes

The Examiners felt that the current maximum number of words allowed (i.e. 2,000 words) per each of the three clinical commentaries prevented the students from elaborating on each of their cases in a sufficient manner. They agreed that the students would benefit from being allowed to write more on each of their chosen cases (i.e. up to 3,000 words) however, being conscious that this would increase student workload by a third, the Examiners also decided to decrease the number of cases

from three to two in order to preserve the overall maximum number of words related to this assignment (6,000 words in total).

The Examiners presented their case at the MSc Integrated Immunology Steering Committee meeting and the Committee agreed to implement the change at the earliest possible time. Subsequently, all current (2016/17) students were canvassed for their opinion on implementing this change with immediate effect and their response was 100% positive.

In assessing applications from candidates seeking to undertake a research degree through part-time study, the responsible admitting body shall have regard to evidence that:

- (i) the candidate is suitable to undertake research at doctoral level;
- (ii) the candidate's proposed topic of research is suitable for part-time study;
- (iii) the candidate's personal and professional circumstances are such that it is both practicable for him or her to fulfil the requirements of the course, and necessary for him or her to study on a part-time basis;
- (iv) <u>if appropriate, the candidate has the written support of their present employer for their proposed course of study and its obligations;</u>
- (v) the candidate can meet the following attendance requirements for their period of part-time study: attendance for a minimum of thirty days of university-based work each year, to be arranged with the agreement of their supervisor, for the period that their names remain on the Register of Graduate Students unless individually dispensed by the Board. During a candidate's probationary period the attendance arrangements must take account of relevant induction and training events scheduled by the Board.'

2) Amend citation reference 1.2 as follows (new text underlined):

'Students may hold the status of Probationer Research Students for a maximum of four terms (or eight terms in the case of a part-time student). Candidates should discuss with their supervisors whether to apply for transfer to M.Sc. status or D.Phil. status, and the most appropriate time at which to apply. In exceptional circumstances the Board may grant up to two terms' extension to this deadline (or one to four terms' extension for a part-time student).'

Explanatory Notes

1. In the current state, the Examination Regulations require:

- each student to pass one three- hour computer-based qualifying exam at the end of Michaelmas Term. The exam was instated in Michaelmas Term 2016 and sat for the first time by a cohort of MSc students in December 2016. The examiners were able to establish that the exam can be completed in 2.5 hours;

- Examiners have been finding it difficult to release (via e-Vision) the final marks of the computerbased qualifying exam taken at the end of Michaelmas Term in time for the resit to take place in the First week of Hilary term. It will be much more manageable if the resit is scheduled towards the end of Hilary term instead;

- the quantitative examination has always been taken by students in February hence statement 'before the end of Trinity term' is incorrect;

- student to resit the quantitative exam in the following Hilary Term, a year later. It will benefit students to resit this exam sooner, i.e. in the same academic year of their final examination.

2. The MSc Taught Course in Pharmacology places a lot of emphasis on *in vivo* research methodology. However, the range of career aspirations from graduates of this programme include positions beyond research in academia and industry Therefore, the Home License course is no longer mandatory but becomes optional.

- (iii) the candidate's personal and professional circumstances are such that it is both practicable for him or her them to fulfil the requirements of the course, and necessary for them to study on a part-time basis;

- (v) the candidate can meet the following attendance requirements for their period of part-time study: attendance for a minimum of thirty days of university-based work each year, to be arranged with the agreement of their supervisor, for the period that their names remain on the Register of Graduate Students unless individually dispensed by the Board. During a candidate's probationary period the attendance arrangements must take account of relevant induction and training events scheduled by the Board.'

- 3. Each candidate must follow a course of study in International Health and Tropical Medicine for at least three terms and for a substantial part of the three subsequent vacations, as determined by the course timetable.

 - (ii) adequate completion of formative coursework;
 - (ii) completion of each of the MCQ examinations prior to the Final Meeting of the Board of Examiners;
 - submission of eight essays of not more than 4,000 words each (excluding references, appendices, tables, figures or figure legends), relating to each of modules (i) to (viii). Two essays will be submitted at the end of Hilary Term in each year of the course, and two essays will be submitted at the end of Trinity Term in each year of the course, on dates to be specified by the Course Committee and published in the course handbook no later than the start of Michaelmas Term of the first year of the course. Each essay topic will be selected by the Board of Examiners. The essay

topics will be distributed to the students at the start of Michaelmas term of the academic year in which the examination is taken;

- (iv) submission of a dissertation of not more than 10,000 words (excluding tables, graphs, references and bibliography), on a subject selected by the candidate in consultation with the dissertation supervisor and approved by the Course Committee. Approval must be sought by no later than the end of Hilary Term in the first year of the course. The dissertation must be submitted in the Long Vacation of the second year of the course on a date to be specified by the Course Committee and published in the course handbook no later than the start of Michaelmas Term of the first year of the course;
- (v) attendance at the Residential School following at least 2 terms of study and prior to submission of the dissertation.

2.Amend clause 7 to add additional sentences:

 Candidates may be required to attend a viva voce after submission of the dissertation, on a date to be arranged by the examiners. <u>Viva voce will normally cover the content of all of the assessed work and will be</u> <u>conducted via video conference.</u>

3.Amend clause 9 to clarify dissertation submission via a secure online method to be outlined in the course handbook:

9. Dissertations shall be submitted in hard copy and in electronic format via a secure authorised online method to the Chair of Examiners, M.Sc. in Sleep Medicine, c/o Examinations Schools, High Street, Oxford OX1 4BG, by dates to be specified by the Course Committee and published in the course handbook no later than the start of Michaelmas Term of the first year of the course

4.Amend clause 14 to change submission time/dates:

14. Candidates who fail to satisfy the examiners in the:

- extended essays will be permitted, by <u>12 noon Friday 2pm Thursday</u> of Week 8 of the term following the term in which the results were notified to the candidate, to resubmit work in respect of the part or parts they have failed on not more than one occasion.
- (ii) dissertation will be permitted, by <u>12 noon-2pm</u> on the first <u>Friday Thursday</u> in September in the year following the original date of submission, to resubmit the work in respect to the part or parts they have failed on not more than one occasion.

5.Amend clause 18 to change the number of years between completing the PGDip and readmitting to the MSc:

18. In the case that a candidate who has been awarded the Postgraduate Diploma is readmitted to the M.Sc. then the following apply:

Such discretion will normally only be exercised if the time elapsed between completion of the final module contributing to the Postgraduate Diploma and registering for the M.Sc. is not more than-two three years.
- (iii) Candidates will be required to submit a dissertation as specified in point 6(v) above, however the deadline for approval of the dissertation subject will be the end of Friday of Week 8 of Michaelmas Term following readmission.

6.Add in clause 20 to take into account candidates who have completed modules for credit prior to admission to the MSc programme.

20. In the case that a candidate has undertaken a module (as outlined in the Schedule) for credit prior to enrolling onto the MSc in Sleep Medicine programme, the organising committee shall have discretion to deem satisfactory completion of the module (including the associated assessment) prior to registration for the MSc in Sleep Medicine. The organising committee shall decide if the candidate has met the attendance and examination requirements in respect of that module under 6.i-iii above. Such discretion will normally only be exercised if the time elapsed between commencement of the accredited module concerned and registration for the MSc in Sleep Medicine is not more than three years. The changes to clauses 6, 7, and 14, aim to clarify the assessment submission process. These changes have been introduced following discussions with the Registry, Department of Continuing Education who administer the submission of examinable material and student status

administration for the MSc in Sleep Medicine.

The amendment to clause 9, removing the necessity of submission of a hard copy of the dissertation, comes following the exams schools changes to permit dissertation submission via Weblearn.

The change to clause 18 has been introduced to allow students to have sufficient time (3 years rather than 2 years) to apply for the MSc course after making the decision to be readmitted to the MSc after completing the PGDip. The admissions process can take a year before entry onto the course and thus we request that students have sufficient time to apply for the MSc. The course committee do not believe this small change will significantly impact on the candidate's knowledge of the current research field.

The addition of clause 20 aims to incorporate examinable data from students who take individual modules for continuing professional development credit into the MSc programme. Students are permitted to take a maximum of three modules for credit. The submission of the extended essay for that module will be assessed by the exam board at the time the module is completed. The student will have completed an MCQ and acquired the attendance requirement. If a student has completed a module(s) for credit and wishes to apply for the MSc, the organising committee will decide if the completion of that module(s) and associated assessment is satisfactory and can be used as part of the MSc assessment requirements. This regulation is similar to that used by the MSc in Evidence Based Health Care, a course that also incorporates units taken for credit into a subsequent MSc programme.

A candidate must offer all four subjects ten assessment units in Part I at one examination, provided that a candidate who has failed at his or her first attempt in any subject or subjects may offer subject 4 or any Part or Parts of subjects 1, 2, or 3 at a subsequent examination (in accordance with clause 4 above), and provided that the Medical Sciences Board may dispense candidates who have already passed a First Public Examination in any subject from the requirement to offer all ten assessment units four subjects at one examinations. In Part I, the examiners may publish the name of a candidate as having passed one, two, three, or four subjects, and the examiners may in addition publish the name of a candidate as having passed one or two Part(s) only of any of the subjects 1, 2, or 3.

5. The outcomes of Part I of the First Examination are as follows:

a) A candidate who has satisfied the Examiners in all ten assessment units will be deemed to have passed Part I of the First Examination.

b) A candidate who has failed one or more assessment units but has satisfied the Examiners in four or more of the seven written or computer-based assessment units (Parts A and B of subjects 1-3, and subject 4), will be deemed to have achieved a partial pass. They will be permitted one further attempt at the units they have failed, within one year of the initial failure.

c) A candidate who has satisfied the Examiners in fewer than four of the seven written or computer-based assessment units (Parts A and B of subjects 1-3, and subject 4), will be deemed to have failed Part I of the First Examination. They will be permitted one further attempt at all seven written or computer-based assessment units, along with any Part C units failed during the first sitting, within one year of the initial failure. Part C units passed during the first sitting can usually be carried forward to the second attempt.

A candidate who is taking one or more Part C units for the second time, having failed their first attempt at those units, may be examined orally on the material covered during the practical course for that subject. However, in the case of a student exceptionally repeating the entire academic year, they will normally be expected to satisfy the Examiners by having a satisfactory record of attendance and performance in practical work.

6. No candidate may offer any assessment unit for Part I of the First Examination on more than two occasions, save in exceptional circumstances. A further exceptional opportunity to offer any assessment unit for Part I of the First Examination shall require application to and approval on behalf of the Education Committee of the University, in accordance with the *General Regulations* for the First and Second Public Examinations.

7. Part II of the First Examination

Subjects 5, 6, and 7 shall each be examined in three assessment units: Part A, Part B, and Part C. Subject 8 forms a single assessment unit. The content and assessment format of the assessment units are provided in the Schedule below. A candidate must offer all ten assessments in Part II. In Part II, a candidate must offer all four subjects at one examination, provided that a candidate who has failed at his or her first attempt in any subject or subjects may offer subject 8 or any Part or Parts of subjects 5, 6, or 7 at a subsequent examination (in accordance with clause 4 above). In Part II, the examiners may publish the name of a candidate as having passed one, two, three, or four subjects, and the examiners may in addition publish the name of a candidate as having passed one or two Part(s) only of any of the subjects 5, 6, or 7. The examiners may request that a candidate attend one or more oral examinations.

8. The outcomes of Part II of the First Examination are as follows:

a) A candidate who has satisfied the Examiners in all ten assessment units will be deemed to have passed Part II of the First Examination.

b) A candidate who has satisfied the Examiners in one or more of the ten assessment units will be deemed to have achieved a partial pass. They will be permitted one further attempt at the unit(s) they have failed, within one year of the initial failure. A candidate who is taking one or more Part C units for the second time, having failed their first attempt at those units, may be examined orally on the material covered during the practical course for that subject. However, in the case of a student exceptionally repeating the entire academic year, they will normally be expected to satisfy the Examiners by having a satisfactory record of attendance and performance in practical work.
9. No candidate may offer any assessment unit for Part II of the First Examination on more than two occasions, save in exceptional circumstances. A further exceptional opportunity to offer any assessment unit for Part II of the First Examination to and approval on behalf of the Educational Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board, according to the procedure set out in the handbook for medical students in Years 1-3.'

3. Amend citation reference 1.16 as follows:

⁶6<u>10</u>. A candidate shall be deemed to have passed the First Examination <u>for the degree of</u> <u>Bachelor of Medicine if</u> they have satisfied the examiners in all the subjects of Parts I and II as specified in clause 2 above.'

4. Amend citation reference 1.17 as follows:

'711. A candidate who has passed Part I of the First Examination for the degree of Bachelor of

Medicine shall be deemed to have passed the First Public Examination.'

5. Amend citation reference 1.18 as follows:

'8<u>12</u>. No candidate shall be admitted to the examination for Part II of the First Examination without first having passed all the <u>assessment units</u> subjects of Part I, save in exceptional circumstances. This shall require application to and approval on behalf of the Educational Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board.'

6. Amend citation reference 1.19 as follows:

9. No candidate may offer any subject or Part of a subject in Parts I and II of the First Examination on more than two occasions, save in exceptional circumstances. A further exceptional opportunity to offer any subject or Part of a subject for Part I of the First Examination shall require application to and approval on behalf of the Education Committee of the University, in accordance with the *General Regulations for the First and Second Public Examinations*. A further exceptional opportunity to offer any subject or Part of a subject for Part II of the First Examination shall require application to and approval on behalf of the Educational Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board, according to the procedure set out in the handbook for medical students in Years 1–3.

7. Amend citation reference 1.20 as follows:

'40<u>13</u>. The examiners may award a Distinction to candidates of special merit in either Part I or Part II of the examination, provided that all examinations for all four subjects specified for that Part in clause 2 above have been offered in their entirety and passed at one examination at the first scheduled opportunity which shall be the candidate's first attempt, except in exceptional circumstances at the discretion of the Board of Examiners following application from the candidate's society.'

8. Amend citation reference 1.21 as follows:

'44<u>14</u>. The examiners may award a Pass with Merit to candidates of special merit in any of the individual subjects 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, or 7, provided that all <u>four subjects ten assessment units</u> of Part I or of Part II of the examination have been offered in their entirety at one examination. The award of Pass with Merit shall be based on performance in Part B of a subject and shall be confined to

candidates who have passed Parts A and C of that subject at the same sitting which shall be the first scheduled opportunity and the candidate's first attempt, except in exceptional circumstances at the discretion of the Board of Examiners following application from the candidate's society.'

9. Re-number citation references 1.22 to 1.26 (numbers 15 – 16).

10. Amend citation reference 1.27 as follows:

'17. Regulations for Part C of subjects 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7'

11. Amend citation reference 1.32 as follows:

'Candidates may be required to undergo oral examination.'

'18. Regulations for the Patient and Doctor Course

The Director of Pre-Clinical Studies or his or her deputy will make available to the examiners evidence (in the form of a list of names, signed by the Director or his or her deputy) to certify that each candidate has participated satisfactorily in the *Patient and Doctor Course*.

Explanatory Notes

1. The Education Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board has agreed that, in line with the First Public Examination for other degree courses, a candidate who fails 4 or more of the 7 written or computer-based papers in the First BM Part I should normally be required to re-sit all the original papers.

2. Candidates are normally allowed two attempts at each written or computer-based paper in the First BM Part I and II examinations. There is currently no limit in the examination regulations on the time that can be taken between the first and second attempts.

For candidates re-sitting papers in the First BM Part I, the re-sit arrangements should provide confidence that progression to the second year of the course is appropriate. For candidates re-sitting papers in the First BM Part II, the re-sit arrangements should provide confidence that progression to the clinical stage of the medical course is appropriate.

The Education Policy and Standards Committee of the Medical Sciences Board has therefore agreed that the regulations should include a time limit between first attempts and re-sits.

Brief note about nature of change: Minor amendments to assessment and dates of resubmissions. New addition to incorporate assessment of essays submitted for credit prior to enrolling on the PGDip programme.

Detail of change

1.Amend clause 6 by removing point (ii) and re-numbering the following points in clause 6 accordingly:

- 6. Every candidate for a Postgraduate Diploma award will be required to satisfy the examiners in the following:
 - (i) attendance at all modules specified in the Schedule;
 - (ii) adequate completion of formative coursework;
 - (*iii*) (*iiii*) completion of each of the MCQ examinations prior to the Final Meeting of the Board of Examiners;
 - (iii) (iv) submission of eight essays of not more than 4,000 words each, relating to each of modules (i) to (viii). Two essays will be submitted at the end of Hilary Term in each year of the course, and two essays will be submitted at the end of Trinity Term in each year of the course, on dates to be specified by the Course Committee and published in the course handbook no later than the start of Michaelmas Term of the first year of the course. Each essay topic will be selected by the Board of Examiners. The essay topics will be distributed to the students at the start of Michaelmas term

of the academic year in which the examination is taken;

(iv) (vi) attendance at the Residential School following at least 2 terms of study.

2 Amend current clause 10 to change submission time/date:

10. Candidates who fail to satisfy the examiners in the extended essays will be permitted, by 12 noon, Friday <u>2pm</u>, Thursday of Week 8 of the term following the term in which the results were notified to the candidate, to resubmit work in respect of the part or parts they have failed on not more than one occasion.

3.Add in clause 12 to take into account candidates who have completed modules for credit prior to admission to the PGDip programme.

12. In the case that a candidate has undertaken a module (as outlined in the Schedule) for credit prior to enrolling onto the PGDip in Sleep Medicine programme, the organising committee shall have discretion to deem satisfactory completion of the module (including the associated assessment material) prior to registration for the PGDip in Sleep Medicine. The organising committee shall decide if the candidate has met the attendance and examination requirements in respect of that module under 6.i-iii above. Such discretion will normally only be exercised if the time elapsed between commencement of the accredited module concerned and registration for the PGDip in Sleep Medicine is not more than three years. The maximum number of modules taken for credit prior to registration for the PGDip in Sleep Medicine that can contribute to the achievement of the award shall be three.

Explanatory Notes

The changes to clauses 6 and 10 aim to clarify the assessment submission process. These changes have been introduced following discussions with the Registry, Department of Continuing Education who administer the submission of examinable material and student status administration for the MSc in Sleep Medicine.

The addition of clause 20 aims to incorporate examinable data from students who take individual modules for continuing professional development credit into the PGDip programme. Students are permitted to take a maximum of three modules for credit. The submission of the extended essay for that module will be assessed by the exam board at the time the module is completed. The student will have completed an MCQ and acquired the attendance requirement. If a student has completed a module(s) for credit and wishes to apply for the PGDip, the organising committee will decide if the completion of that module(s) and associated assessment is satisfactory and can be used as part of the PGDip assessment requirements. This regulation is similar to that used by the MSc in Evidence Based Health Care, a course that also incorporates units taken for credit into a subsequent post graduate taught programme.
