### **Detail of change**

- <sup>1.1</sup>1. The examination in this school will be under the supervision of the Humanities Divisional Board.
- <sup>1.2</sup>2. All candidates must follow a course of instruction in Celtic Studies at Oxford for a period of six terms, full-time. <u>In order to pass the degree</u>, a student must pass all its assessed components and attend compulsory language classes in one Celtic language that has not previously been acquired to a high level.

The programme will be assessed by three papers and a dissertation.

- <sup>1.3</sup>3. The subjects of the examination shall be as follows:
  - <sup>1.4</sup>(a) Celtic linguistics.
  - <sup>1.5</sup>(b) Irish literature up to 1700.
  - 1.6(c) Welsh literature.
  - $^{1.7}(d)$  Special Subjects. The list of special subjects will be published in the Course Handbook.
- <sup>1.8</sup>4. Assessments shall comprise:
- <sup>1.9</sup>Papers I, II, and III: essays of up to 8,000 words on:
  - <sup>1.10</sup>Either
  - <sup>1.11</sup>(i) Two papers, one on each of two subjects selected from those described in section 3 (a), (b), and (c) above; and
  - <sup>1.12</sup>(ii) One paper on a Special Subject as described in Section 3 (d) above.
  - <sup>1.13</sup>Or
  - <sup>1.14</sup>(i) One paper on a subject selected from those described in section 3 ( $\alpha$ ), (b), and (c) above; and
  - 1.15(ii) Two papers, one on each of two Special Subjects as described in section 3 (*d*) above.
- 1.16One essay must be submitted by noon on Monday Tuesday of Week 8, Hilary term, Year 1;
- $^{1.17}$ Two essays must be submitted by noon on  $\frac{\text{Monday}}{\text{Tuesday}}$  of Week 8, Hilary term, Year 2.
- 1.18 Paper IV: A thesis of 20-25,000 words to be submitted by noon on Friday Tuesday of Week 6 7 of Trinity term of Year 2.
- 5. The topics for the essays and the dissertation will be agreed in consultation with the Course Director and approved by the Steering Committee as detailed in the Course Handbook.
- 4-20 6. All assessments must be formatted and submitted according to the specifications given in the Course Handbook.
- 1.217. The examiners may examine any candidate viva voce.
- <sup>1.22</sup>8. In order to pass the degree, a student must pass all its assessed components. A candidate who has failed to satisfy the examiners in the examination may enter again for the examination as outlined in the General Regulations for the Degree of Master of Philosophy.

# **Explanatory Notes**

The course handbook and other information given to student states clearly that candidates need to have attended a language class if they have not studied high level; this is determined at point of admission and then enrolment. There is no test, but a tutors will report on attendance.
