# The original notice requested:

Amend citations and re-number as follows:

- 1.11. Within the Division of Social Sciences, The programme shall be administered by the School of Archaeology under the supervision of under the supervision of the Graduate Studies Committee of the School of Archaeology.
- 1.22. Each candidate will be required to follow a course of instruction in Archaeology in accordance with their stream (see clause 3) on a full-time basis across three terms and a substantial part of the vacations for a period of 11 months. for three terms. Four modules will be followed and the programme will be examined by a portfolio of work, three takehome essays, four extended essays and a dissertation.

- 1.33. The normal assessment requirements for the degree are as follows: Candidates will complete a core course in Archaeological Principles: Data and Theory and will submit a portfolio consisting of the work candidates carry out for and during their classes, including a research proposal of no more than 300 words based on their initial ideas for their dissertation. Further information can be found in the virtual learning environment. The portfolio will be submitted by noon on Tuesday of week 1 of Hilary Term.
  - [new citation] (a) Three take-home essays (each no more than 2,000 words) for a List A stream-specific module taught in Michaelmas term. The three essays must be submitted no later than noon on Tuesday of week 0 of Hilary term; and
  - [b] A portfolio of work carried out for and during their classes for the core module in Archaeological Principles: Data and Theory taught in Michaelmas term.

    The portfolio must be submitted no later than noon on Tuesday of week 1 of Hilary term; and
  - Inew citation (c) Two extended essays (each of no more than 5,000 words) for a List B stream-specific module taught in Hilary term. The two essays must be submitted no later than noon on Tuesday of week 0 of Trinity term; and
  - [new citation] (d) Two extended essays (each of no more than 5,000 words) to be submitted no later than noon on Tuesday of week 4 of Trinity term from any of the following:
    - Inew citation i. any other module offered and available from List B in any stream, or
    - [new citation] ii. any module offered and available from Schedule B in the MSt in Classical Archaeology taught in Hilary Term, or
    - Inew citation iii. any module offered and available in the MSc in Archaeological Science, unless the module under clause 3c is a subject offered in the MSc in Archaeological Science, and
  - [new citation] (e) A dissertation of no more than 15,000 words on a topic agreed with their supervisor. The dissertation must be submitted by noon on the last Wednesday of August.
- <sup>1.4</sup>4. Candidates will select their chosen stream as part of their application. Candidates wishing to change stream will be required to apply to the Graduate Studies Committee by no later than Friday of week 2 of Michaelmas term. Changes beyond this date will not normally be permitted. Not all streams will be offered every year, and changes to stream are subject to availability.
- <sup>1.5</sup>5. Candidates will submit three take-home essays (each no more than 2,000 words) for a core course from List A in their chosen stream as outlined in clause 4, as set out in the Course Handbook. The essays will be submitted by noon on Tuesday of Week 0 of Hilary term.

out in the Course Handbook. The two essays will be submitted by Tuesday of week 4 of Trinity term.

Candidates will submit two extended essays (each of no more than 5,000 words) for a second option course from one of the following (taking into account any requirements for combinations of courses set out in the Course Handbook): i) a course offered and available from List B in any stream, or ii) an option offered and available from Schedule B in the MSt in Classical Archaeology taught in Hilary Term, or iii) a subject offered and available in the MSc in Archaeological Science, unless the module under clause 6 is a subject offered in the MSc in Archaeological Science. The two essays will be submitted by Tuesday of week 4 of Trinity term.
- <sup>1.8</sup>8. Candidates will propose the extended essay topics under clauses 6 and 7 in consultation with the relevant course tutor and their supervisor (if they are different). The proposed title of the dissertation must be submitted for approval by the Chair of Examiners by 12 noon on Tuesday of week 8 of Hilary term. The dissertation must be submitted by the last Wednesday of August in the year in which the examination is taken.

Candidates must upload their Archaeological Principles' portfolio, four extended essays, and dissertation to the University approved online assessment platform by the specified deadlines.
